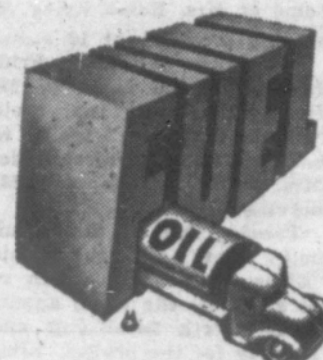

style on tables with a centerpiece of yellow rosebuds, yellow daffodils and yellow and white chrysanthemums, flanked with a crystal candelabra and white candles.

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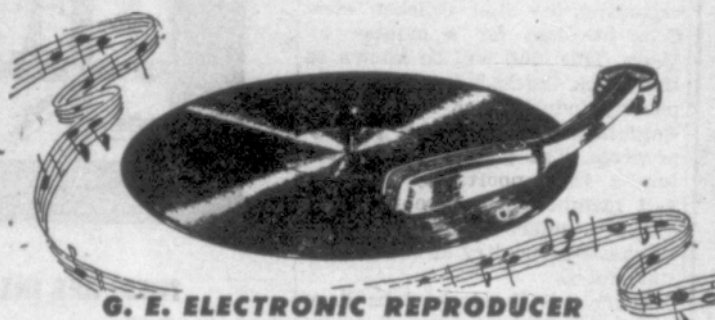
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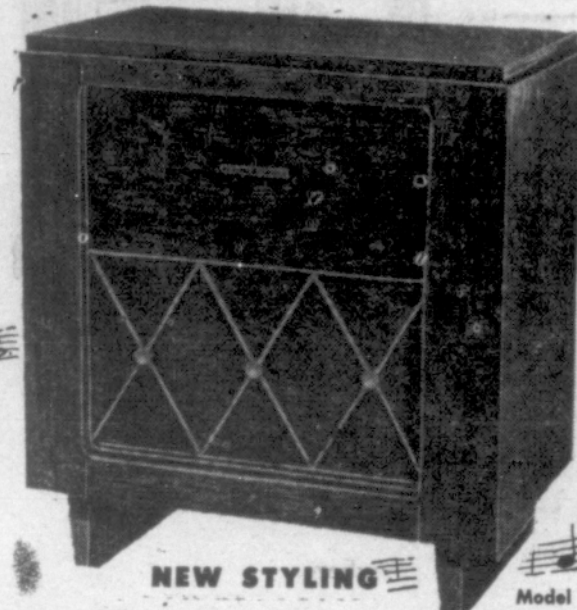
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
