Funeral services were held for William (Benny) Milton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Milton, at the Schroeder chapel in Myrtle Point Tuesday, January 4. "Benny," a well known youth of this community was born at Rainier, Washington, August 25, 1931, and moved here with his parents a year or so ago.

He was found on Dec. 27 unconscious in his car at the garage some distance from his home, where he had parked it after visiting with friends in Myrtle Point and attending church services. The youth was rushed to Mast hospital and on Wednesday was removed to Falk hospital where he died Saturday from a cerebral hemorrhage.
