Winning high honors were Mrs. Ice and Mr. Richardson, while Mrs. Richardson and Mr. Ice won second prizes.

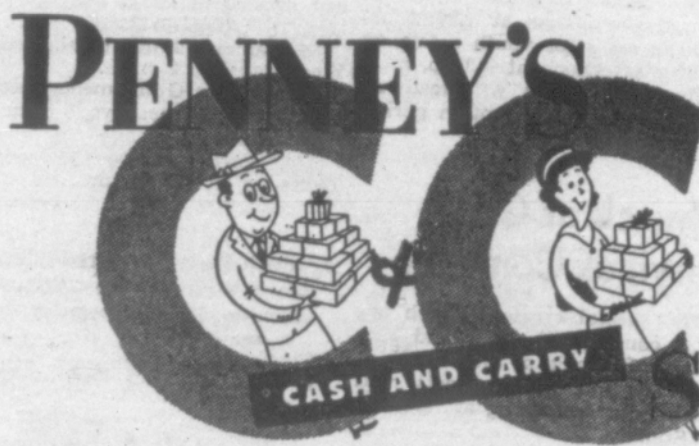

Eagles Entertain

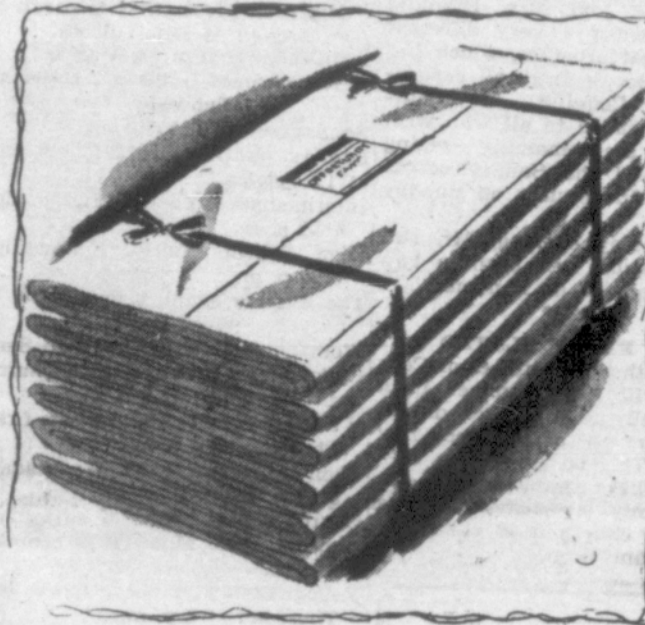
