

Leatherman Heads Coos Livestock Group In 1949

Howard Leatherman of Fairview will head the Coos County Livestock association again during 1949, according to action taken at the annual meeting held at Myrtle Point on Saturday, January 8. Others re-elected include John Carman of Gaylord, vice president; Mrs. Leona Bryant of Bridge, secretary-treasurer, and Howard Goldiron of Powers, director. Sam Dement of Myrtle Point was elected as director, replacing Ralph Christensen, deceased.

Following a motion picture illustrating the handling of wool, which was shown at the meeting, Dement who is chairman of the livestock committee of the planning conference, led a discussion on different phases of livestock management. The control of tansy ragwort, which is spreading throughout the county, was a point of considerable interest, since this weed is poisonous to livestock and is difficult to combat. Pictures showing the extent of the spread of this weed and its method of growth were shown. A committee was appointed to meet with other groups at a later date to discuss the forming of a weed control district. The committee includes Dement, Bob Geaney, and John Carman.

A report was given on spraying livestock for insect pest control and tentative plans made for trials in several communities where some of the newer chemicals will be used. Livestock growers present expressed appreciation over the adjustment in the amount of fire patrol tax paid on grazing land and voted to send a resolution to the Coos Forest Fire Patrol association and to the State Board of Forestry for the help they had rendered in this regard. It was reported through discussion at the meeting that the tax on grazing land in classified areas has been adjusted to 3c per acre, for grazing land in non-classified areas 5c per acre, while on other forest land the tax is 10c per acre.

The livestock association will sponsor a special award in the amount of \$50.00 to pay premiums to the exhibitors of the best pen of market lambs at the 1949 show. A similar award to beef cattle producers exhibiting at the fair will be given and the details of this will be worked out by a special committee of the livestock association which will work with the County Fair board in improving the livestock section of the fair. The committee appointed for this purpose by the chairman includes Thomas Luttrell, D. R. Curry, and Foster Thompson of Gaylord and Leland Peterson of Coquille.

In response to a request from J. L. Smith, a member of the County fair board, this committee will work with the board in an attempt to improve the livestock division of the fair. To make more definite plans for this summer meeting for all livestock producers with the fair board was proposed.

Albert Powers spoke in memory of Ralph Christensen, a long time member and active worker for the livestock association, who passed away since the last meeting. In recognition of his helpful influence and the esteem in which he was held by his associates, a resolution will be sent to Mrs. Christensen and family.

The annual meeting of the Western Oregon Livestock association which is to be held at Gearhart on January 25 and 26 was announced and local producers urged to attend by Chairman Leatherman. The Western Oregon meeting will open on the morning of the 25th with a special program of speakers with committee meetings during the afternoon and a banquet in the evening. The program on the second day will include the reports of committees and a number of special features. The principal speaker will be Alan Rogers, chairman of the Public Relations committee for the National Livestock association.

Spot Maps Will Put Kids On Paper

Spot maps of Coquille and the surrounding area are now being made up by Supt. of Schools Ray Hunsaker as he maps out the houses where all grade school children live.

An involved and complicated job, Hunsaker is mapping the ages, grades, and location of each student in the Coquille public schools.

When completed the map will be used as the basis for a bus route both in town and in the country to allow for proper timing and routing of school buses.

March of Dimes Drive Opens Up Tomorrow In Coos

An army of Oregon volunteers whose numbers will eventually total between 15,000 and 20,000 will lay down the initial barrage of the 1949 polio battle tomorrow, opening date of the annual March of Dimes which this year will run through Jan. 31.

Dale Elliott, Coquille, Coos county March of Dimes chairman, said that the impending campaign shapes up as "the most intensive" in the 11 years that the organized drive for infantile paralysis funds has been conducted. And, he added, "it certainly is the most crucial."

Emphasis was lent to his warning by final polio case figures for 1948 as compiled by the United States public health service. The crippling disease struck down a record 27,658 Americans during the year just ended, according to the federal bureau. The compilation gave Oregon 219 cases, compared with 110 in 1947, California 5,560 and Washington 386, and it represented a 600 per cent case increase over the 1947 total for the three states.

The financial plight of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and its chapters was described as "desperate" by Foundation President Basil O'Connor in a nationwide broadcast to March of Dimes workers. He said that the Foundation's epidemic aid fund which stood at \$6,000,000 at the start of 1948, wound up the year \$520,000 in the red, and that the 1949 drive must bring in \$30,000,000 "if we are to meet our obligations."

Dr. E. T. Hedlund of Portland, 1949 Oregon March of Dimes chairman, recalled that eight counties in the state had polio of epidemic incidence in 1948. He said that the treasuries of these county chapters and several others in Oregon have "reached the vanishing point."

"If we're not now ready for the great effort immediately ahead, then we never will be," Dr. Hedlund said today on his return from Polk and Benton counties where he checked into campaign organizations. Dr. Hedlund and Felix Montes, state representative of the National Foundation, have been busy for three months assisting in the setting up of March of Dimes machinery in 36 counties, and they estimated today that an unprecedented 15,000 to 20,000 Oregonians will have lent a hand before the drive ends.

The complete memberships of civic and fraternal groups in many cities will participate, they reported. Granges are planning special basket socials; the 168

American Legion posts in the state have planned a variety of benefit events; high schools and colleges are scheduling benefit athletic contests; labor unions are issuing special appeals to their members, and many theatres contemplate basket collections.

Committee for the various cities in the county are: C. E. Weed, Myrtle Point; A. R. "Lex" Wheeler, North Bend; W. P. McKenna, Coos Bay; Jack Ward, Bandon; Alice Klenz, and the Coquille Woman's club with a committee of Mrs. Ernest Kuntz, Mrs. Max Powers, Mrs. W. E. Cross, Mrs. Julius Ruble, and Mrs. Ida Owen; Ray Getchell, Powers, and Harold Ross of Powers.

Goal for Coos county is \$10,000 this year.

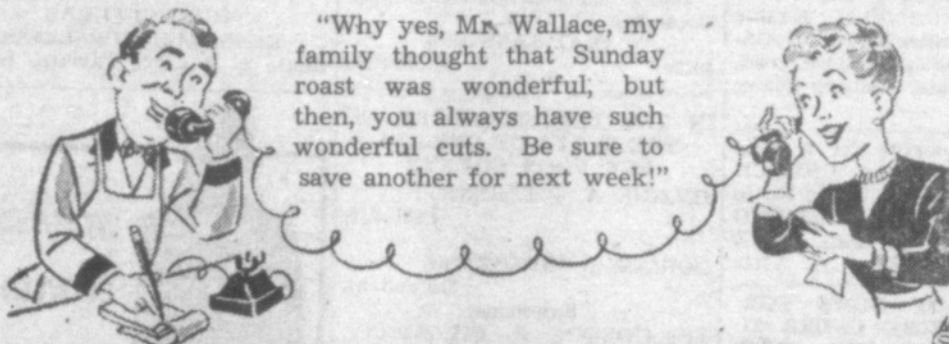
Rotarians are sponsoring the orchestra in order to raise funds to help out their public service projects.
