Coquille Girl Scouts Join In National Observance of 'Girl Scout Week' Mar. 12

Girl Scouts of Coquille will join in the nationwide celebration of the Girl Scout 37th birthday, Saturday, March 12, it was announced today by Mrs. Ralph Stuller, president of the Girl Scout association. The observance will commemorate the founding of the Girl Scout movement 37 years ago by Juliette Gordon Low in Savannah, Georgia, March 12, 1912.

Aspects of the local celebration will include: a sale of Girl Scout cookies on March 12, with all local troops participating. Mrs. Orlando Anderson, phone 374-R, is chairman. Storehouse for the cookies will be at the home of Mrs. Virgil Beaudette, phone 282-R. This is the largest sale planned to date, with a total of 1500 boxes ordered. Proceeds will go toward helping to finish a third Girl Scout meeting room in the Community building.

Sunday, March 13, is "Go-to-Church" day, with all Girl Scouts attending the church of their own choice.

From the first Savannah troop and its twelve members, the Girl Scout movement in the United States has grown to include a total membership of 1,384,864 across our country and in its possessions. Membership in Coquille totals 160 girls, 12 troops and 60 leaders and volunteers.

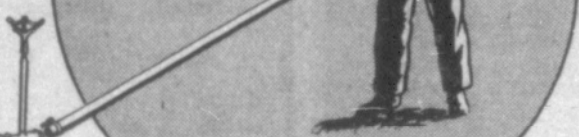

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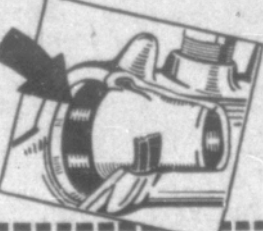
