New Books To Library

Two books were donated this week to the Coquille Public library by the Business and Professional Women's club, "The Correspondence and Journal of Captain Nathaniel J. Wyeth," and a copy of the Oregon Historical Society journal for September, 1900, which contains material used in the study course on Oregon history.

Other new adult books received this week include "Cutless Empire" by Mason, "Gather Ye Rosebuds" by Nolan, "Lost City of the Incas" by Bingham, Information Please Almanac for 1949, "Minerals" by Zinn, "Group Work with American Youth" by Coyle, "Kennel Show and Field" by Larson, "American Quilts" by Robertson, "Whistle, Daughter, Whistle," by Best, "Cheaper by the Dozen."

Two new mysteries had been added to the present selection, "Any Shape of Form" by Daly,

and "The Franchise Affair" by McIntosh. In addition a number of mystery stories have been donated in recent months by Allen Smith.

New juvenile books include "Pocahontas" by Seymour, "Here's a Penny" by Haywood, "The Bunch Quitter" by Patton, "Black Dinah" by Starr and "Gotch, the Story of a Cow Pony" by Sweetman.

High Schools Will Plant Forest Trees

Planting of new trees on the Beaver Hill county forest lands will be done this spring by both Bandon and Coquille high schools, County Forester Jim Moorehead said today.

The Bandon high school students will plant on March 18th, and Coquille will plant on April 7th. Each group will plant 5000 seedlings of fir and Port Orford cedar.

Adult Classes Slated For City And County Towns

Residents of the North Bend-Coquille-Coos Bay-Bandon area will have their choice of five night classes for adults offered by the General Extension Division of the State System of Higher Education and scheduled to begin next week.

Due at Marshfield high school are Oregon History, a two-hour course to be taught by William McLean, beginning Monday, Mar. 21, and Art in the Environment, a two-hour course instructed by Miss Roberta Jones, beginning Tuesday, March 22.

Classes to be given at Coquille high school are Oregon School Law and System of Education, for two hours of credit, by Leonard Mayfield, starting Monday, March 21, and Art in the Environment, two hours, under Miss Jones, due to begin Thursday, March 24.

Miss Jones will also give Art in the Environment at Bandon high school, beginning Wednesday, March 23. The same course may be taken for three hours credit, but must be registered for under the title, Art Structure III.

At North Bend Junior high school Miss Jones will offer Teaching of Art, a three-hour course beginning Monday, March 21.

All the classes will meet one night a week for ten weeks. The hours are 7 to 10 p. m. Fees are \$7.00 for a two-hour course, and \$10.50 for a three-hour course. Registrations may be made at the first or second class meeting.

Address Changes To Help Public

Cooperation of the public is requested by the post office department in complying with new regulations in force March 1 for notifying newspapers and magazines of change of address or correcting present address where it is not the one where delivery is made.

When a change of address written on the publication, a card form 22-S will be attached to the publication for the addressee to notify the publishers of such change or correction, where the address is not the address of delivery, or is completely omitted.

It is requested that in every case that a publication is received with the card form 22-S attached that it be immediately filled out and sent to the publisher. After five

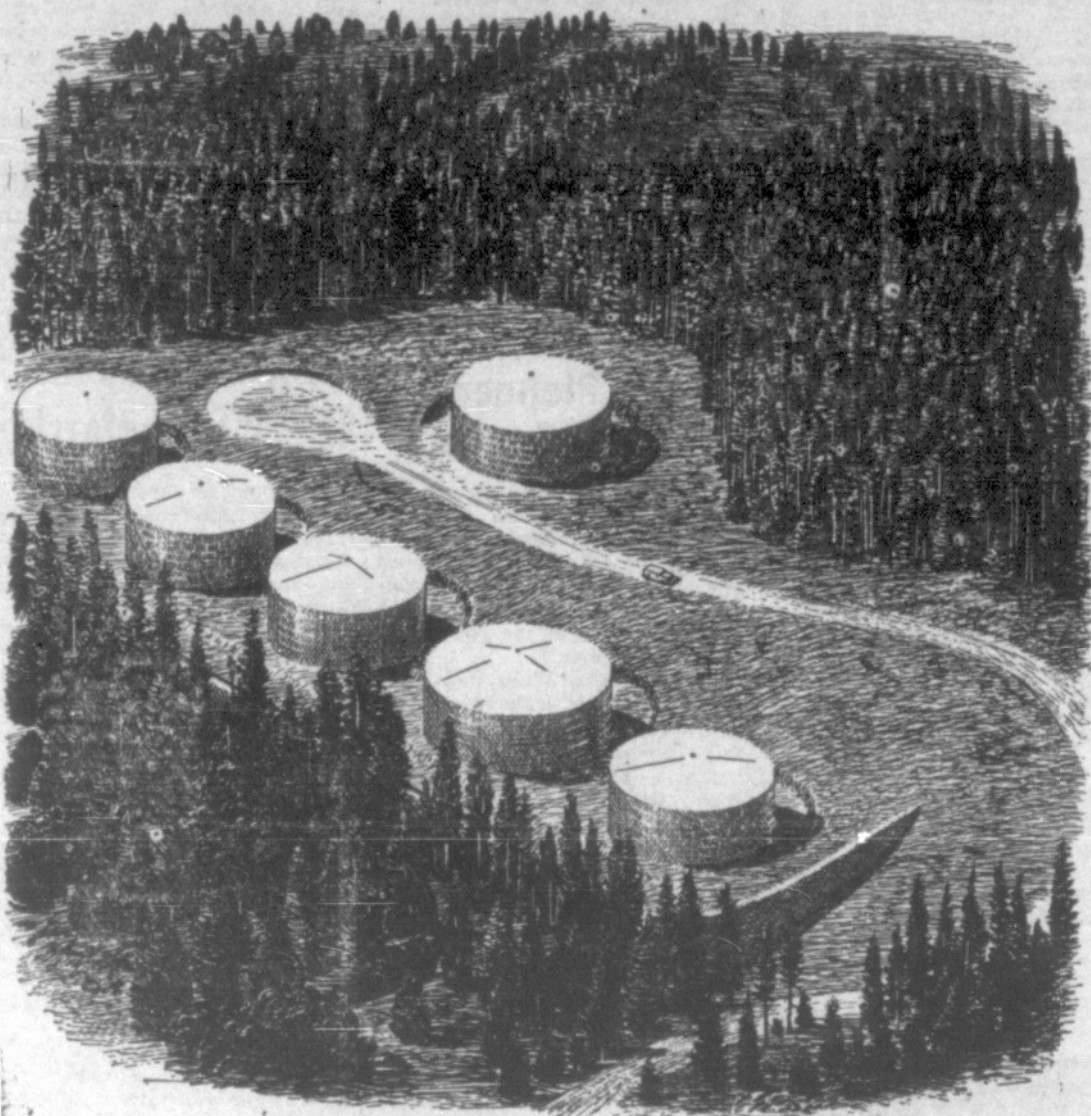

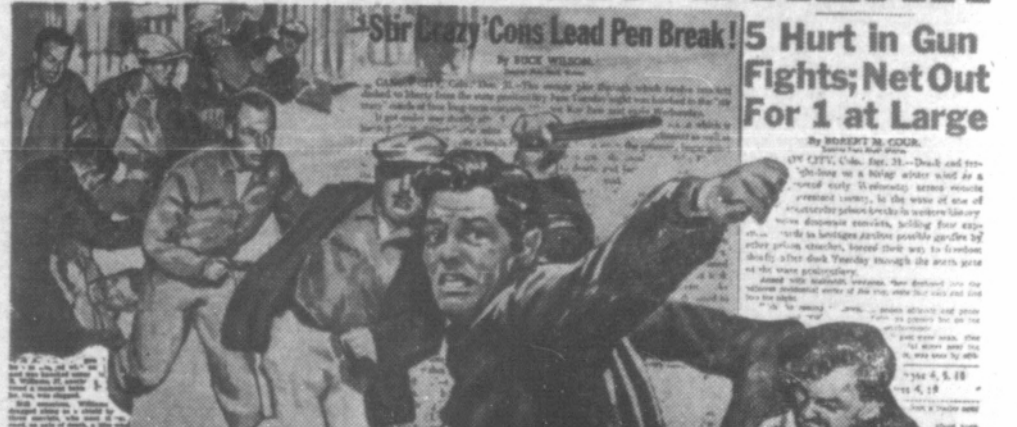

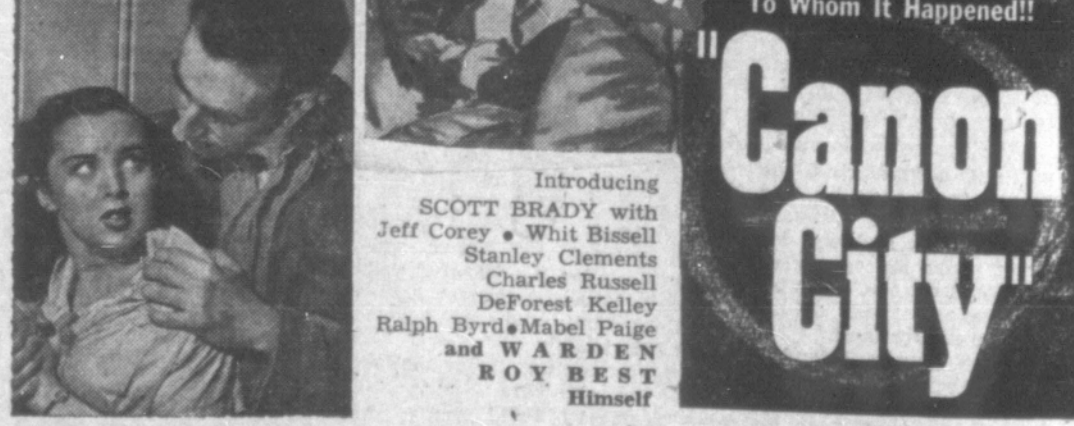
