The fleet-footed charges of Coach Kurt Beckham compiled a total of twenty-eight points to walk away from their nearest rivals, North Bend and Marshfield. These two teams finished in a tie for second place with 24 points each.

The Coquille Red Devils finished fourth with fourteen counters.

Coquille, failing to place first in any event, missed her best opportunity to stage a winning event when Art Richardson, ace Red Devil miler, was forced out of competition because of illness.

Tom Coleman captured a third in the pole vault; Dallas Farmer did likewise in the discus and then came back to take second place in the high jump and Art Richardson finished third in the javelin before being forced out of the meet.
