Homemade Silo 'Directions' Given By State In Bulletin

How to build a homemade wood stave silo—that's the title—is explained in a new extension circular, number 529, just issued by O.S.C. in answer to numerous requests for an economical structure to store grass silage. Copies of the new circular are now available at county extension offices or direct from the college.

Authors W. L. Greibeler, agricultural engineering department staff member, and M. G. Huber, extension agricultural engineer, have added a table in their 12-page publication which is intended

to assist farmers in planning silos to meet individual needs. Diameter and silo height, the authors write, is based on size of herd, length of feeding season, amount of silage to be fed so that at least three inches are removed daily to prevent spoilage.

The circular details all phases of silo construction including foundation, addition of staves, roof, chute, anchors and painting. Plans are for the identical silo which Huber has demonstrated in numerous field days throughout western Oregon during the past two or three years. Numerous drawings and a bill of materials are included.

Sudan Grass Gains In Favor

Sudan grass is firmly established as a summer pasture plant in Oregon, with an estimated 45,500 acres grown in 1948, say H. A. Schoth and H. H. Rampton, federal agronomists at Oregon State college, in a new revision of experiment station bulletin No. 425, "Sudan Grass, Millets and Sorghums in Oregon."

These three related crops are best adapted to the coast region, southern Oregon and the Willamette valley, a few places along the Columbia in eastern Oregon and on the Vale-Owyhee irrigated projects, the bulletin shows. Adapted varieties, cultural methods and management practices are discussed.

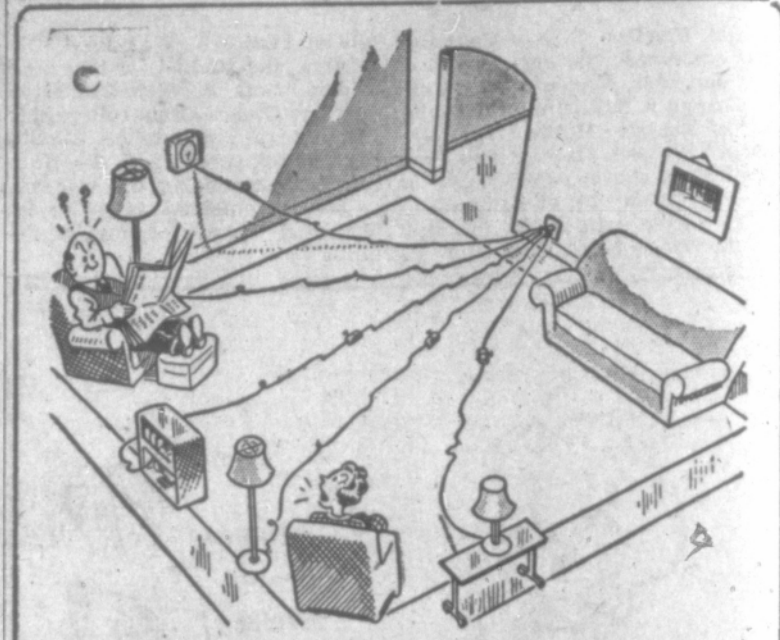
