Employment Still Touchy Picture Government Says

Employment and jobless made up a "touch and go" picture in this area, it was reported today by the U. S. Employment reporting office of Coos Bay.

Local unemployed continued to average between five and six times as many as during a comparable period in 1948. A noticeable drop took place during the first and last weeks of the month, but with the lumber industry contributing the majority of the jobless, each change in weather affected continuity of work. Most small sawmills had down periods when logs could not be delivered. There were \$86,452 in unemployment benefits paid out of this office, compared with \$16,408 in the same month in 1948.

Opening of mills and camps pushed hiring totals up, but gave little new work, as most were rehires of old personnel. Employment Service placements tripled over February, but were still low when compared with previous years. New hires were few, and competition put a premium on skill and experience. There were few jobs for women, and their applications for work increased rapidly, particularly among those formerly engaged in several woodworking occupations. Re-

fersals of unemployment claimants increased, with 42 being placed on new jobs.

There will be some definite improvement during the next few months, although summer employment will not come up to the 1948 level. Ten lumber firms, representatives of small and large employers, expect to hire only 73 additional employees during the coming two months. Employers in general are not ready to forecast summer conditions when production is generally highest.
