Music Concert Pleases Audience

Two fine bands, a girls' Glee club, a close-harmonizing girls' trio, two majorettes and three solo instrumentalists, all were on hand to make the Coquille high and junior high school annual music festival an outstanding event when more than three hundred guests entered the Coquille Community building Tuesday treat.

The junior high school band, comprising some seventy pieces led by Bandmaster Carroll Nickels, opened the evening's festivities. The youngsters played several band arrangements and popular numbers and did an outstanding job.

The band was followed by the Girls Glee club of the Coquille high school. This group of vocalists won a superior rating at the Southwestern Oregon Music festival and will compete for state honors at Klamath Falls later this month.

Three members of the club, Maxine Parrish, Norma Jean Cole and Nancy Marney, a trio that has been heard widely throughout Coos county in recent weeks, sang two popular numbers at the conclusion of the Glee club's part of the program.

They, in turn, were followed by the Coquille high school band which produced, as well as several fine band selections, two soloists from its ranks. Jack Purkey, a freshman who earned a superior rating in the junior division of the recent Music Festival, played a trumpet solo, and Donna Mast, winner of a superior rating in the senior division, played two numbers on the baritone saxophone. Both of these young musicians will compete in the State Festival.

Majorettes Joan Peart and Carol Anne Creager gave a masterful exhibition of the art of baton-twirling during an intermission of the band music. Both of these young ladies will also appear at

the Klamath Falls festival. Perhaps one of the finest musicians heard in Southwestern Oregon in a long time appeared as a guest of the Coquille high school band during the evening. He is Jerry Wright, a junior from Bandon high school. Jerry displayed excellent technique as he rendered a cornet solo that brought a tremendous thunder of applause. Jerry will also be on hand when the State Festival gets under way at Klamath Falls, and if Tuesday night's performance is any criterion, young Wright will bring more honors to Coos county.

SALEM, April 20—An Opportunity Bond drive quota of \$277,919.00 was assigned to Coos county at Salem last night at a Governor's banquet climaxing a day of preparations for Oregon's participation in a six-week campaign.

Quotas and preliminary plans were discussed at a round-table session preceding the dinner at Salem's Senator hotel at the close of Patriots' Day, the anniversary of the battles of Lexington and Concord.

Diners heard a broadcast of President Truman's bond drive address to a group of several hundred notables in Washington, D. C. Then Governor Douglas McKay took the rostrum, sounding a call to all Oregon citizens to participate in the savings effort which has been set for May 16 through June 30.

Safety Committee Report Told

Reporting for the safety committee of the Coquille Chamber of Commerce, Chairman George Burr told the group last Monday that a partial study of the committee's recommendations has been made by the City Council and that one of the provisions has been accepted while another was discarded.

The council has painted yellow

lines at the intersections of Sixth and Taylor and Tenth and Taylor, but will not remove the parking meter at the northwest corner of First and Taylor. It was contended by the safety committee that clear vision was denied motorists driving east on First street and that possible collisions could be averted by the removal of the parking zone.
