Lester Powers Dies On Friday

Lester Ralph Powers, age 37 years, was killed in the Stanley Logging camp Friday.

Lester was the efficient whistle punk, and no one knows just what happened. When he failed to respond to signals, investigation was made and he was found unconscious.

He was rushed to the Mast hospital where he died a few hours later.

Lester was born in Coquille in 1911, but when very young moved to Powers and has spent most of his life here. He graduated from the Powers high school.

Lester was an outstanding athlete, being manager at the time of his death of the famous basketball team. He leaves to mourn his passing his mother, Mrs. Charles Powers, two sisters, Alice of San Francisco and Irene, Mrs. Phil Barrette of Coquille who is in the sanitarium at the present time, Salem; a niece, LaVerne Barrette of Portland, and Phil Barrette, Jr.

Funeral services were conducted at the Schroeder Funeral Home in Myrtle Point, Monday April 25, Rev. Wiley officiating.

Rodent Control Talk Given

Guest speaker at the Tuesday luncheon of the Coquille Soroptimist club was John Myers, who works through the Coos county health department and the state department of agriculture on rodent control.

Mr. Myers stated that rodent damage in the United States in one year is between three and four million dollars. He explained methods of rodent control, namely, use of poison bait, trapping, elimination by fencing out, by rat-proofing buildings and by keeping premises free of refuse.

Mr. Myers stated that anyone may receive the help of his office in eliminating rats, mice or moles by contacting the Coos county health department.

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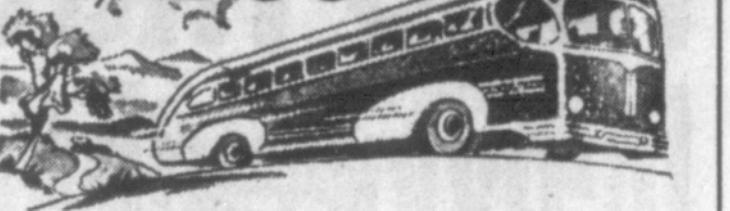

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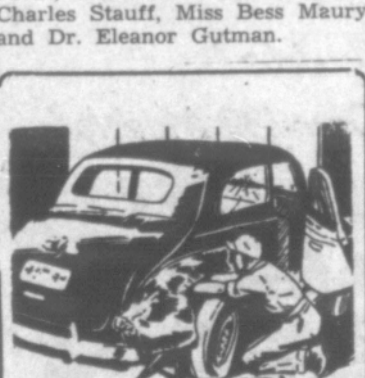
