Allegany Loon Lake Road Traversable

"Some of the most beautiful country in the world, but take a high-centered car," so says Commissioner Fred Kruse after a trip with Commissioner Fred True and County Road Engineer Floyd Robb from Coos Bay over the mountains to Loon Lake and Mill creek.

The road is dry now and passable, albeit some of it is one-way and on one side there's a sheer drop of 400 feet. Silver Falls is in the area, and it is a choice spot for real Coos scenic beauty.

According to Commissioner Kruse the road is not too good for low centered cars, but with a higher centered car it is all right. He drove over in a Chevrolet.

At present much of the land is in a state park and, according to County Judge Louis Felsheim the road would make one of the finest scenic loops for tourists in Southwestern Oregon.
