

Loggers Score Second Win of Season As Coos Bay Defeated 7-3 Here

After suffering two straight losses in Southwestern Oregon league play, the Coquille Loggers came back last Sunday, June 19th, for their second win of the season at the expense of the luckless Coos Bay nine. The final score of the game, played at Coquille's Fortier Field, was 7-3.

"Cocky" Brewer ran into a spot of trouble in the first inning when he walked the first man to face him, gave up a three base hit to Coos Bay's second baseman O'Dell, and then got nicked for three singles before he could retire the side. Coos Bay scored two runs on the four hits and one walk.

Coos Bay was held hitless after that first inning until Samson singled in the sixth to score O'Dell who had reached first when McIntee's throw to first went wild.

One more hit for the Bay team came through in the ninth when Ford singled, giving Brewer a six hit game, four of which came in that first frame.

The Loggers evened the count in the bottom half of the first with two runs scored on two Coos Bay errors, a wild pitch and a walk.

Brewer collected the first Logger hit of the day when he singled in the second but was left stranded as Everhart set down the next three Coquille batters.

Coquille put the game on ice in the third when Everhart walked both Marchand and Fassett, was nicked for a single by McIntee to score Marchand and then gave up a single to Bob Douglas, scoring both Fassett and McIntee.

One more Logger rally was launched in the sixth when Hawkins opened with a single but was caught at second on a fielder's choice. Brewer then stole second, and Al Forkner was safe at first when the Coos Bay second baseman, O'Dell, bobbled the ball, Brewer going to third.

Dave Douglas then flew out to centerfield and Forkner stole second, putting runners on second and third with two men out.

Joe Marchand, Coquille left fielder, then stepped to the plate, rapped out a sharp single to score Brewer and put Forkner on third. Marchand stole second and, as the Coos Bay pitcher was trying to decide what strategy to employ, Forkner stole home, making the score Coquille 7, Coos Bay 3.

Charlie McIntee again topped batting honors with one single and a triple in four trips to the plate. The triple came in the fifth inning when McIntee was left stranded.

Brewer struck out eight men, gave up one walk and six hits. His team-mates committed one error.

Coos Bay's Everhart struck out one, gave up four bases on balls and was nicked for eight hits. His mates were charged with five errors.
