Powers City News Relates Fire Warning, Budget Okeh, Watering Regulations, Water Election

Powers residents are warned against starting any fires for burning rubbish or other purposes, of like nature without first obtaining a fire permit from the Fire Marshal Jack Hannon. This ruling went into effect June 20, 1949, and all the rules and regulations apply to persons living within the city limits of the City of Powers. This order is signed by Harold Ross, mayor, and Orvil Knight, city recorder.

The city of Powers held a special budget election on June 17th, to give the voters an opportunity to vote on the question of exceeding the six per cent limitation for funds to carry on the business of the city. The results of the voting were: Yes 39 votes, No 20 votes.

On June 12th, 1949, regulations by the Powers Water district were in effect in regard to hours for irrigation and lawn sprinkling. In North Powers irrigation and sprinkling may be done on the following days and hours: even calendar days only, 6 a. m. to 8 a. m. and again on same day, 6 p. m. to 8 p. m.

For South Powers, irrigation and lawn sprinkling on odd calendar days, 6 a. m. to 8 a. m. and again in the evening on same day, 6 p. m. to 8 p. m. All violations of this order are subject to penalties by the water commission as they see fit.

The Powers Water district will hold a special election on June 24th at the water office, for the purposes of voting on the proposed budget for the fiscal years 1949-50. Voting hours are from 12 noon until 6 p. m.

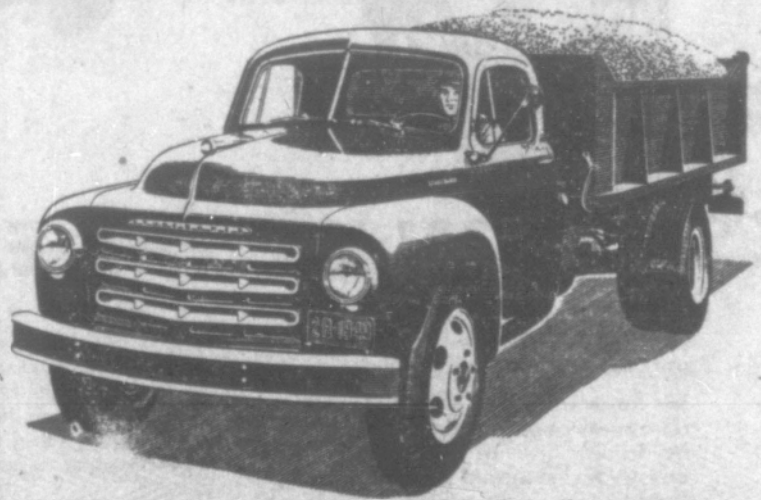
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
