Want To Vacation In A Nice Forest Camp Within Only a Few Miles of Coquille? Here They Are, No Fire Permits Needed

Campfire permits will not be required in 1949 on the Rogue River, Siuslaw, Whitman and Umatilla national forests in Oregon and the Olympic national forest in Washington, according to an announcement by H. J. Andrews, regional forester, Pacific Northwest region of the U. S. forest service, Portland, Oregon.

On the other national forests in this region, campfire permits will continue to be required during the period July 1 to September 30, except on certain specified improved campgrounds.

"The lifting of the campfire permit requirement on these five national forests is on a trial basis," Andrews stated. "We hope to be able to use the experience gained this year in determining whether permits for building campfire are necessary and justified as a fire prevention measure or whether further easing of requirements can be made."

Andrews praised the public for its cooperation in being careful with fire in the forests. He said that the fire prevention record was excellent during the war years and that this trend has continued since then. If the experiments this year indicate that the campfire permit is not needed to make campers fire conscious, it may be possible to ease this requirement more widely in the future.

Campers using the fire forests excepted from the permit requirement are urged to camp at improved spots where stoves, fireplaces and other facilities have been provided for their safety and enjoyment.

Campfire permits are not required at the following:

Coal Creek: On South Fork of Coquille river road, six miles south of Powers. Elevation 480 feet. Parking six cars, five campsites, two fireplaces, two stoves, five tables, two benches, two toilets, stream water. Supplies at Powers. Fishing, hunting, scenery.

Daphne Grove: On South Fork Coquille river road, 16 miles south of Powers. Elevation 900 ft. Space two trailers, parking 30 cars, six campsites, community kitchen, 12 stoves, 14 tables, two

benches, one flush toilet piped and stream water. Supplies at Powers. Fishing, hunting.

Elk Creek Falls: On South Fork Coquille river road, 6 miles south of Powers. Elevation 450 feet. Parking ten cars, two campsites, four fireplaces, four tables, three benches, two toilets, stream water. Supplies at Powers. Fishing, hunting and scenery.

MacGribble: On Middle Elk road 11 miles southeast Port Orford, partly dirt road. Elevation 300 feet. Parking 10 cars, six fireplaces, three stoves, three tables, one toilet, stream water. Supplies at Brush Creek on Coast highway five miles and at Port Orford. Camping, hunting.

Myrtle Groves: On South Fork Coquille river road 9 miles south of Powers. Elevation 600 feet. Space one trailer, parking 12 cars, three campsites, six fireplaces, six tables, two toilets, piped stream water. Supplies at Powers. Fishing, hunting, scenery.

Rock Creek: On South Fork Coquille river road 1 mile south of Powers, partly dirt road. Elevation 1000 feet. Space one trailer, parking space ten cars, four campsites, six stoves, 12 tables, two benches, one toilet, stream water. Camping, picnicking, fishing, hunting, scenery.

Waters Creek: On Rogue river and on South Fork Coquille river road 33 miles south of Powers, 2 1/2 miles north of Agness and 35 miles up Rogue river by boat from Gold Beach, dirt road. Elevation 125 feet. Parking eight cars, eight campsites, eight stoves, eight tables, two toilets, pipe water. Supplies at Agness. Fishing, scenic, horses 3 1/2 miles. Boats at Agness.

OUT OF THE WOODS

FOR THE YOUNG FARMER

The farm woodland unit in the Pacific Northwest is practically always a unit of a farm on which the main interest is in the dairy herd or in the cultivated crops and the meadows. The true woodland has soil that is good for trees and for little else.

The ideal is to make the most of the woodland for itself alone. Practically, it must be a scrub workhorse for the rest of the farm, a "woodlot" as of old, but promising future yields of all the new values that appear in the light of modern farm forestry science and modern merchandising of farm products.

The farm woodland unit is the perfect part of the farm for farm youth. There the young farmer can best learn to be responsible for management. Through his school, the 4-H Club, the Future Farmers of America Chapter, or other groups, he can meet with foresters, with the business men who deal in forest products in his trading center, and with others of his age out on the farms.

The young farmer of school age is used to learning new things. He can look forward to realization of yield from a slow-growing crop. The farm woodland is a home of wild life. In size of growth it is the biggest thing on the farm. There is mystery in its promise. Science has only begun to expose the marvels that may be made from a stick of pulpwood. The farm woodland is a frontier. It is an adventure.

And there is money in it for ambitious, informed and well-organized farmers, young or old.

Service In Farm Forestry
Imagine a more or less typical farm and forest community of Western Oregon and Washington, naming it "Green Home." A state highway runs up the valley of the Lemolo River, on the track of a corduroy road of pioneer times—first of all an Indian trail.

There is a sawmill in Green Home that cuts 75,000 feet of lumber per day, five days a week—most weeks. There are 20-odd smaller sawmills in the Green Home trading area and 30 logging outfits.

Up Lemolo Valley and the valleys of its tributary creeks there are 180 farms with woodlands.

Green home, county seat of Mamook County, has a soil conservation district and is county headquarters for farm organizations and for dairy and other cooperatives. There is a Mamook

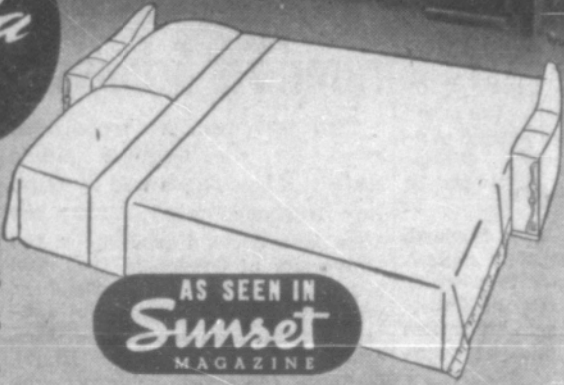
