Red Cross Plus Sign Of Our Age, Says Speaker

"The Red Cross is the plus sign of our civilization," Edwin D. Rounds, assistant regional director, San Francisco, told the first Coos county Red Cross meeting of the 1949-50 fiscal year last Saturday in a luncheon meeting at the Lutheran church in Coos Bay.

During the meeting a certificate of service was presented William Huggins, chairman of the 1949 fund campaign for the manner in which the drive was completed, and a certificate of honor was presented to Mrs. J. A. Berg, Coquille, retiring vice-president, for the work of the Coos county chapter of the American Red Cross for outstanding service to the community.

Elected to head the Coos county Red Cross chapter were: Elmer Russell, North Bend, vice-chairman; Mrs. Clarence Osika, recording secretary; Frank Whitlock, North Bend, treasurer, and directors: Thurston Jacobson and R. R. Shiplee, North Bend; Mrs. J. A. Berg and Donald Farr, Coquille; Jack Dunn, Myrtle Point; Mrs. E. F. Lucas, Bandon; Mrs. Ann Wood, Empire; Mrs. Leonard Hall, Charleston; R. T. The San Francisco speaker stressed the fact that because of the uncertainty of the future, it is important to preserve and maintain our strength. "The strength of the military to protect us against any eventuality, and the Red Cross as an adjunct of the military."

Red Cross work is seen in many, many phases of everyday life, the speaker said, and it is difficult to place a monetary value on what has been done. One example is the life-saving and swim classes conducted in nearly every city, where thousands of lives have undoubtedly been saved from the work.

In conclusion the speaker said the Red Cross demonstrates practical living of a life of brotherhood around the world, linking of hands with one purpose, to serve humanity.
