PORTLAND, July 7 (Special)—Members of the Oregon All-Star football team, who will meet the Portland All-Stars in the second annual Shriners' hospital football game, have been told to report here Sunday, August 14, for an opening of practice the following day.

The two teams, comprised of graduate seniors who were the cream of last fall's high school crop, will collide here at Multnomah stadium Saturday night, August 27, in what is destined to become one of Oregon's most celebrated sports attractions. All proceeds go to the Portland unit of the Shriners' hospital for crippled children. The state team won last year's inaugural classic by a score of 38 to 13.

Mel Ingram, who piloted Grants Pass to the state prep title last year, will be head coach of the Oregon squad. He will be assisted by Lee Ragsdale of Medford and Harry Thompson of Gresham. olic, with Bill Robertson of Oregon State as trainer.
