

Try Cool Milk Drinks For Hot Days

Hot July days call for cool refreshing drinks—something to quench the thirst and cool the palate. Everyone has their own favorite milk drink—tall, cool and satisfying. After a game of golf or tennis, a strenuous garden workout, or a warm shopping tour, a refreshing flavorful milk drink will cool you down and pep you up.

Milk coolers are grand to serve when guests drop in, or when the children's gang wanders hopefully into the kitchen on hot afternoons. Milk drinks, besides being refreshing, are nourishing and satisfying too. Milk's high food value goes hand in hand with flavor and coolness—good down to the last frosty drop? They are a very pleasant way to include part of the daily milk requirement in the youngsters' diet—and they won't have to be coaxed to take seconds.

Ice cream plays an important part in making cooling milk drinks—keep it on hand in the freezing compartment of your refrigerator, and you will never be at a loss for refreshments, anytime.

Raspberry Milk Shake is a grand cool drink that everyone will enjoy.

Raspberry Milk Shake
 1/2 cup fresh raspberries
 1 1/4 cups milk
 Few grains salt
 1 pint vanilla ice cream
 Few whole raspberries
 Wash berries, drain well and crush with a potato masher; measure and combine with milk, salt and three-quarters of the ice cream in a shaker. Shake until mixture is a smooth blend. Pour into four six ounce glasses and top each glass with remaining ice cream and one or two whole raspberries. Serve immediately.

Sun Tan Special
 (Serves 2)
 2 Tbsp. sugar
 1 tsp. root beer extract
 2 cups milk
 Nutmeg
 Combine ingredients and shake well. Pour into chilled glasses, add nutmeg. Serve.

Ice Cafe au Lait is tangy and richly flavored—perfect for a hot summer evening when friends drop in.

Ice Cafe au Lait
 2 cups milk
 1 1/2 sq. bitter chocolate
 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
 1 Tbsp. cold water
 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
 2 cups strong black coffee
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup whipping cream
 Dissolve cornstarch in cold water. Dissolve chocolate in double boiler, add cinnamon, sugar and coffee which has been heated. Add cornstarch slowly and cook for 5 minutes, stirring. Heat milk and add to coffee mixture, then cook for 10 minutes until mixture thickens, beating with rotary beater. Cool, then chill well. Serve in tall glasses and top each serving with a tablespoon of whipped cream and a maraschino cherry.

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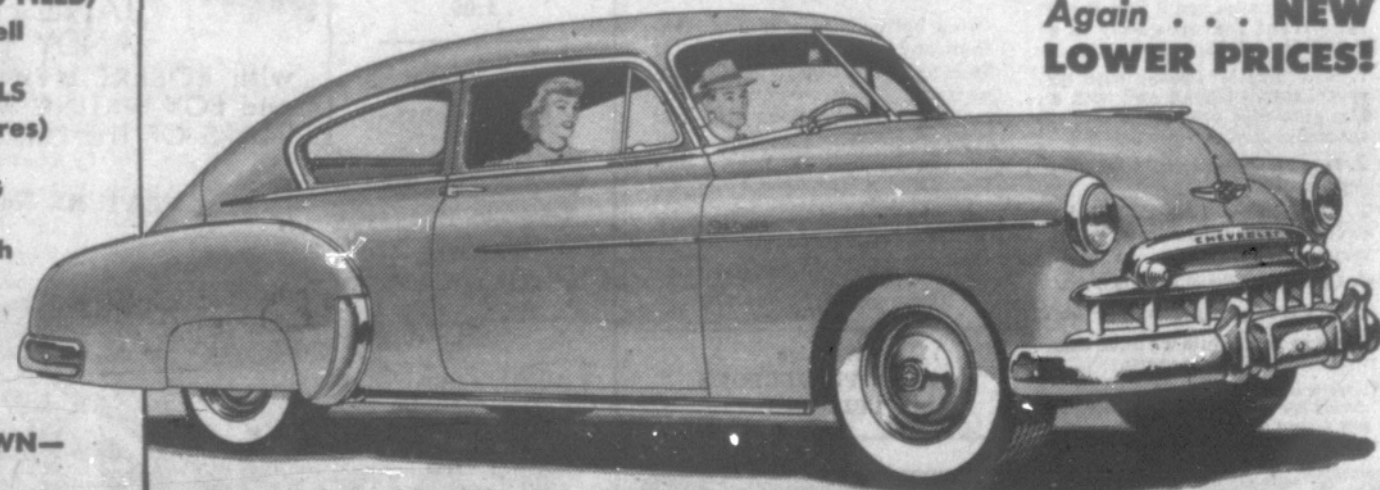


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
