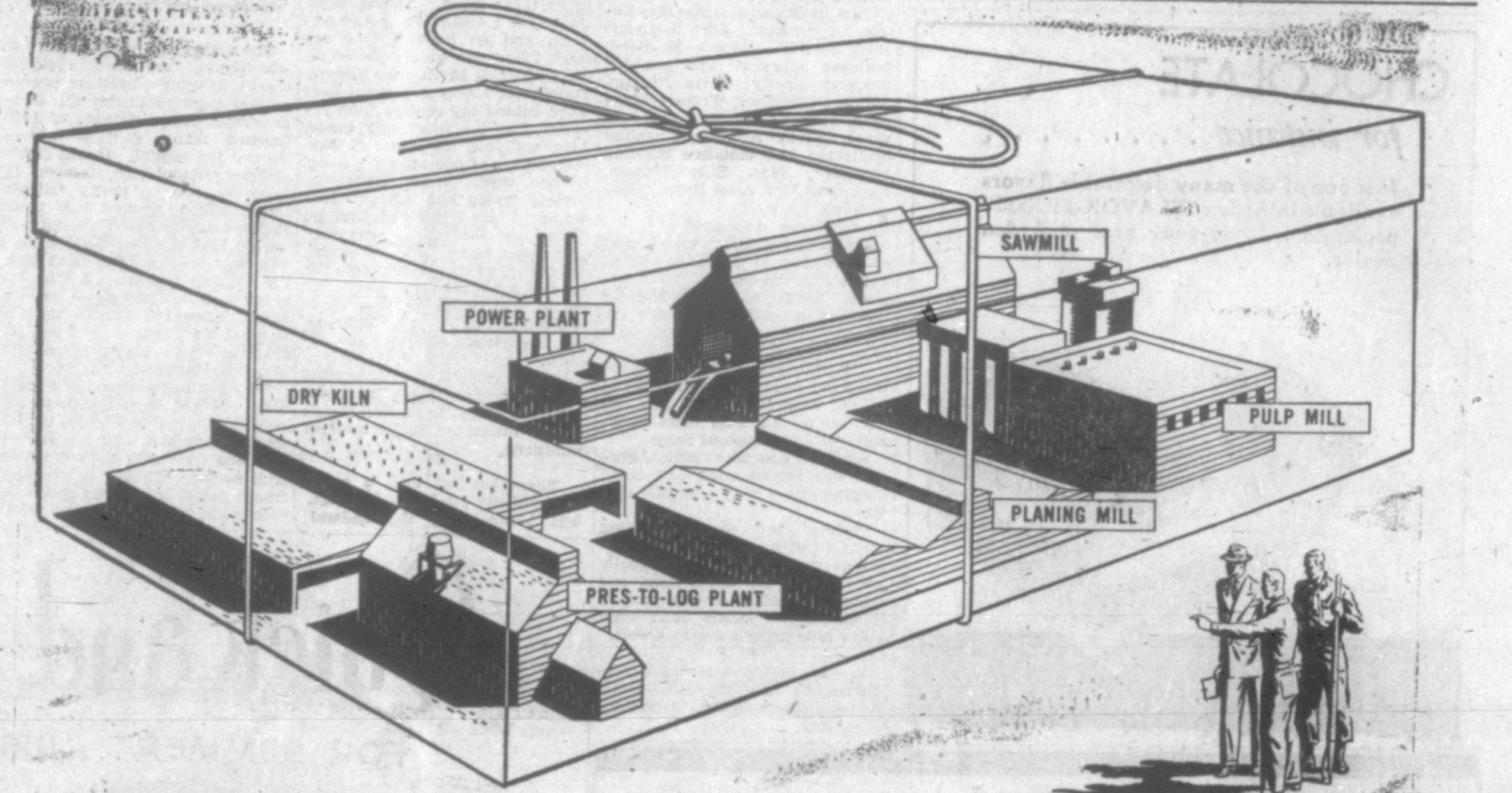
Said street improvement is to be 50 per cent at the cost and expense of the property to be benefited hereby. Bids may be submitted for either the whole work necessary to complete the proposed improvement or for such subdivision thereof as will not conflict materially with the completion of the remaining portions. Forms of bids for contract and bond may be had upon application to the City Recorder. The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, with or without cause. A certified check in the sum of 5 per cent of the amount bid must be submitted with such bid, to be forfeited to the City of Coquille in the event the bidder refuses to sign the contract and execute a bond as provided for in said Ordinance. Said bond to be in the sum of 50 per cent of the total amount of the contract. The work must be completed within 45 days from the awarding of the contract, or within such further time as the Council may allow. Bids must be filed on or before the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. on the 1st day of August, 1949. All bids must be made for a lump sum, accompanied by unit prices, for the purpose of estimating additions or deductions made during the course of the work.
