Powers Lions Clubbers Hear Report On Seeing-Eye Institute At Meeting

The meeting of the Powers Lions, July 11th, was highlighted by the presence of the special guests of the club; Miss Florence Rushing and Audrey Langbecker, both of Coos Bay. Mrs. J. M. Shepherd appeared as a guest of the club and as hostess for the visitors from Coos Bay. During the meeting the question was raised concerning the provision of veterinary services for the seeing-eye dog which was recently acquired by Miss Rushing. The club decided to provide this service at the expense of the club.

The question of obtaining insurance on the dog was also under discussion but no definite conclusion was reached. The matter is under investigation.

During the course of the meeting Miss Langbecker was asked to take the floor and relate some of the highlights of the trip to Morris-town. She stated that they were shown every courtesy by the Lions of Portland and New York and that the cooperation of those clubs made the trip very much more pleasant for them. She also related their experience in flying over the Rockies in the vicinity of Denver. She stated that the air was very unstable and that they were more or less ill when landing in Denver.

She stated when they returned the United Air Lines employees gave them the best of attention and services and that they both appreciated this courtesy on the part of the air line employees.

Following Miss Langbecker, Miss Rushing took the floor and gave some information concerning the dog and the Seeing-eye Institute. She stated that the dog had received extensive training before she arrived at the school and that she was not required to take the full six weeks training with the dog since the dog was soon adapted to her and accompanied her around the grounds of the school and other places.

She stated that the average life of such dogs was from 8 to 12 years. She also said that other dogs must be kept away from the seeing-eye dogs.

Miss Rushing was profuse in who made it possible for her her thanks to the Lions and others greatest wish to come true.
