He has held successful revival meetings in this country and in the British Isles. He is a regular contributor to religious magazines, and is the author of a number of books.

Many Powers people will remember Dr. Pope from a previous visit two years ago, when he conducted a three-weeks' revival campaign. He is known as a forceful speaker with a message of faith and hope for the world today.
