

Tax Assessor Staff Studies At Medford

The in-Service Training for Assessors and Appraisers will be held at Medford, October 10-11, under the auspices of the Assessment and Taxation Division of the Oregon State Tax Commission. This, the fourth such training course held this autumn, will be attended by the following six assessors and their Assistants: C. A. Myers, Jackson County; Merle E. Griffin, Josephine County; Otis Metsker, Klamath County; Charles W. Forrest, Coos County; George W. Sutton, Curry County, and Ned Dixon, Douglas County.

Attending from Coquille beside Assessor Forrest are deputies Francis Flannigan, Alvan Hickam, Robert McLeod, Albert Armstrong and Ellis Selander.

Commissioner Robert D. McLeon, in charge of the Assessment and Taxation Division, which is particularly interested in the officers making appraisals and assessments, is bringing a number of experts to give lectures and explain the new book published by the Tax Commission, "Factors of Cost in Building Materials," copies of which have been mailed to all Assessors in the state. This is the first revision of cost factors made in eighteen years and it represents, among other matters, the experience of technicians in the field. The factor book is intended as a guide to appraisals and once understood it will save Appraisers time and effort in dealing with this phase of their responsibilities.

Because of the many changes that have occurred in the construction of housing and the various types of buildings, the factor book will be invaluable.

Former Coos Man Passes Away

Norman O. Dodge, 87, for 29 years custodian of one of the school buildings at Oregon State college, died Thursday. At the time of his retirement at OSC in 1947, he was probably the oldest active employee at the college.

Born in Phoenix, Ore., March 29, 1862, he spent all his life in Oregon. He was a member of the Odd Fellows lodge of Alpine. While in Portland he made his home with his son, Randolph, of 7513 N. Funeral services were held at the McHenry funeral home at Corvallis Saturday, with burial at the Corvallis cemetery.

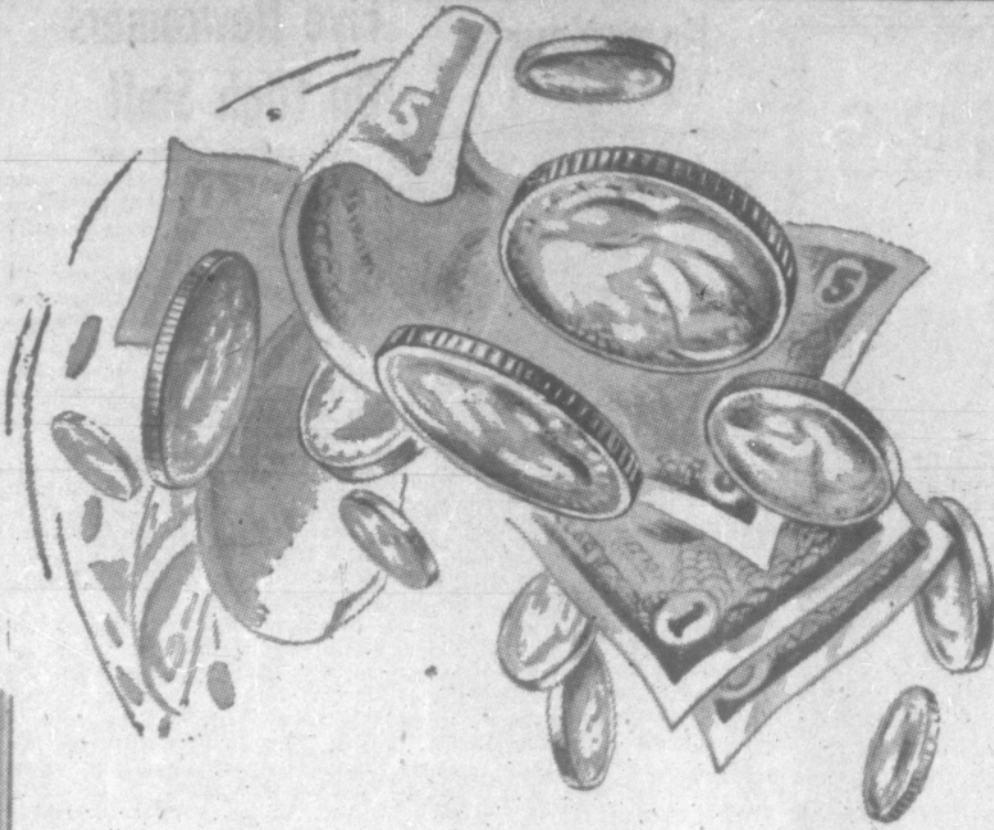
Coquille Library
