More Protein For Dairy Cows Helps As Pastures Fail

Now that pastures are slackening off it may be necessary to increase the protein percentage in dairy feed grains unless first quality alfalfa hay or ample legume silage is available, is the timely reminder from H. P. Ewalt, O.S.C. extension dairy specialist.

Dairymen can frequently save money on their protein needs this time of year, he says by checking mill run prices when they need to buy a protein supplement to increase their protein feeding 2 percent or so. More expensive sources of protein are soybean, cottonseed and linseed meal.

As heavier grain feeding gets underway, it is advisable to feed according to production on an individual cow basis. Otherwise, low producing cows may be overfed at the expense of the cows that may be capable of producing more butterfat than their limited feed will permit.

October and March are the two peak cow freshening months, reminds Ewalt. A dry cow needs all the good roughage she will eat and 5 to 10 pounds of grain mix each day if she is to be in condition to produce milk at the peak of inheritance after calving.

Looking at the state as a whole, Ewalt says the supply of feed grains is considerably above average. Hay supplies, meanwhile are 8 percent above average on a per animal unit basis.

Oregon dairy cows numbers have shown recent signs of an upturn. Although still at the second low point in 17 years, the cow population has shown a steady increase since the bottom was reached about June 1948. Estimated number of cows in production on June 1 this year was 225,000, a two per cent increase as compared with the same month a year previously.



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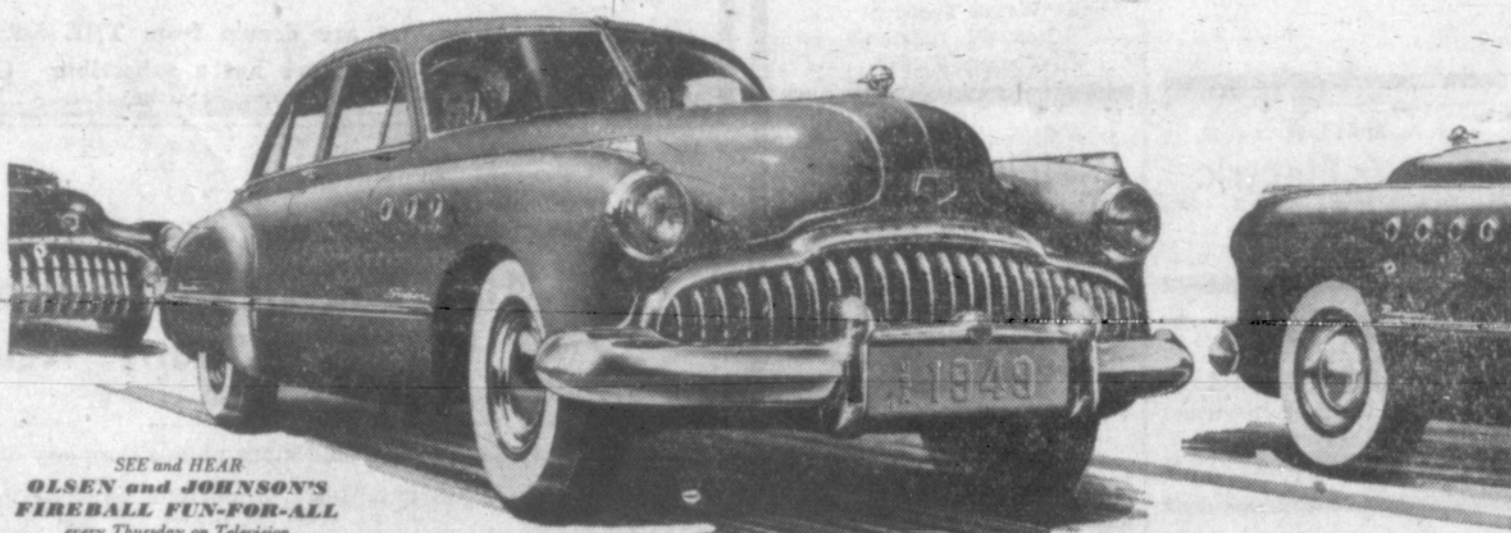
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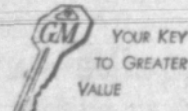
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
