Low Bid Given On Channel Work

The Pacific Dredging company of Paramount, Calif., is the low bidder, with \$870,611, for dredging 10 1/2 miles of the main ship channel in Coos Bay to a depth of 39 feet at mean low water. Bids were opened Tuesday by Lt. Col. Donald Elliget, acting district engineer. The project also calls for dredging an anchorage basin, two turning basins, and dredging the channel to a width of 300 feet.

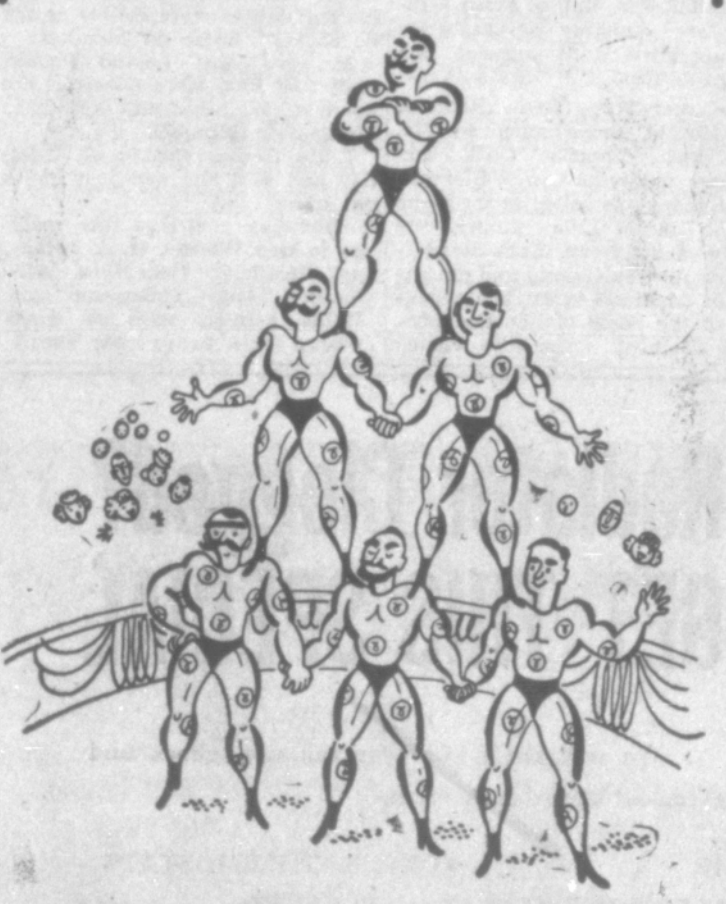
