Lower Operating Costs Give Kids Better Lunches At Cheaper Price

Lower operating costs at Coquille high school's cafeteria have enabled the administration to effect a cut from 25 cents to 20 cents in noon lunches, Ray Hunsaker, superintendent of schools, said yesterday.

Mrs. Frances Coleman, home economics instructor and cafeteria manager, has been able to lower these costs through the federal school lunch program and the ability to buy materials at a lower cost, Hunsaker said.

Mrs. Coleman said the new price of six cents a bottle. Des-

sert may be purchased for a nickel. Dessert is currently selling for a dime.

Encouragement to purchase a meal ticket at a cost of \$3.50 is being done by Mrs. Coleman. This ticket will purchase 14 meals and may be left at the cafeteria if there is a possibility that the student may lose it.

Menu for next week will include creamed chicken with vegetable salad, Monday; chili with beans, potato salad, and prunes, Tuesday; hamburger on bun, macaroni salad, fruit juice, Wednesday; hot beef dinner sandwich, mashed potato, brown gravy, celery and carrot sticks, Thursday; macaroni and cheese, cabbage, celery, apple salad, fresh pears, Friday.

For another nickel the students may purchase cake on Monday, fruit cobbler on Tuesday; fruit jello, Wednesday; pudding, Thursday, and cranberry or apple pie, Friday. Mrs. Coleman said yesterday that the lowered cost will not affect the quality of the lunch.
