Coquille Juniors Lose To North Bend 13-0 Meet Marshfield Here Saturday Night

The Coquille junior high school Wildcats lost a thrilling, hard-fought game to North Bend last Saturday afternoon on the North Bend field. Final score was 13-0.

Excellent defensive play by the Coquille boys kept the game scoreless throughout the first half, but they, in turn, were also unable to penetrate the stubborn North Bend defense. Play throughout that first half centered around the fifty-yard marker.

A fake reverse in the third quarter accounted for the first North Bend touchdown, but the conversion attempt failed. Score at the end of the third quarter was 6-0.

Gary Claver, Wildcat quarterback, showed excellent ability as a passer. The Wildcats outgained North Bend by better than sixty yards through the air, a total that would have been considerably more if the Wildcat ends had been able to hang onto Claver's tosses.

The final North Bend touchdown came late in the final quarter. This time the conversion was good, making the final score 13-0.

Coquille's Red Devils return to the gridiron with this coming Friday night after a week's rest that gave Coach Spike Leslie an opportunity to revamp his injury-ridden team and polish a number of plays that are expected to give the visiting North Bend eleven a real run for their money. Game time is eight o'clock.

Eddie Howe, Coquille's first-string fullback who was injured in the first few minutes of the Roseburg game, will still be on the sidelines. Eddie's shoulder is improving but he definitely will not start this week.

Coach Leslie expects this to be the toughest game the Red Devils have played this year, but he also feels that his squad will be in much better shape than they were against Roseburg and should make a real game out of this, the final home game before Armistice Day.

North Bend is tough and fast, according to Coach Leslie and although the Bulldogs lost to Marshfield last week by a score of 20-12, that is no indication of the power in the North Bend line. Marshfield scored all twenty points in the first half against a team that was entirely different in the second half when North Bend held Marshfield scoreless while tallying two touchdowns of their own.

In any event, Coquille's Red Devils will be in there fighting every minute, Coach Leslie stated, and will endeavor to unseat the league-leading Bulldogs.

McCuskey came home with a fat five-point buck killed on Bald Mountain just east of John Day, Oregon. The deer weighed 191 pounds skinned and weighed five days after the kill. McCuskey estimates that the large buck weighed better than 220 when shot.

Art Richardson and Ivan Haddix, in company with T. V. Richardson of Myrtle Creek, accounted for two five-pointers and one forked horn seven miles east of Myrtle Creek. The largest weighed close to 200 pounds.
