

Huge Timber Sale Set In February By Government

About 40 million board feet of timber has been readied for the first 1950 timber sale of the Coos Bay Forest district of the Bureau of Land Management. Sale is to be held early in February 1950. This sale will be the first of several to be held in 1950 for marketing of Bureau timber in this area. All tracts to be placed on the market for 1950 have been selected in accordance with the pre-planned annual sales program adopted by the Bureau of Land Management in June 1949 after consulting with local advisory boards on the yearly sales program.

Most of the volume offered in this sale is located in Coos county. District Forester Youngblood of the local Bureau of Land Management office announced this morning that a substantial volume of the sale will be sold at auction. The oral auction sale will be held at the Bureau District office in the Post Office building, Coos Bay, Oregon. Timber to be offered under the sealed bid procedure will be handled in the usual manner with bids to be mailed direct to the office of the Regional Administrator, Bureau of Land Management, Swan Island, Portland 18, Oregon.

Individual maps have been prepared of each sale area. These maps are available to interested bidders, and can be obtained upon request either by mail or in person at the Bureau of Land Management office in Coos Bay.

In keeping with the market price of lumber, Douglas Fir stumpage on Bureau lands for the February sale has been lowered about 20 percent. This reduction totals 40 percent from the peak of 1948. The other lowering of stumpage was effective last May.

Tracts of Bureau timber to be sold at oral auction are - those that are located contiguous or adjacent to logging roads constructed by logging operators. For this sale, logging roads to these tracts have been assigned to the Bureau of Land Management for reassignment to the successful bidder for the Bureau Timber. Timbered tracts being offered where no road is involved, but equally accessible to all bidders must be purchased by sealed bid.

Deputy collectors of the U. S. Internal revenue department will be at the city hall Friday, tomorrow, to aid farmers in making out their 1949 tax return.

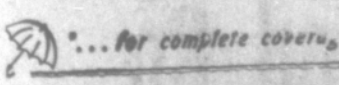

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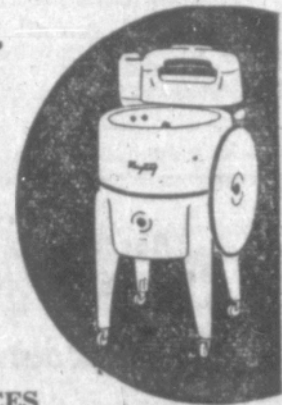
