DATE PUDDING AND TOPPING

(Celia Lee Tested Recipe)

Add 1 cup boiling water to:
1 cup dates, cut in fourths
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon shortening
1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

Allow to cool, then add:
1 egg, beaten
1 1/2 cups sifted Crown Best Patent Flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
Put into pan large enough to allow about 1 inch rising. Bake at 350° about 40 minutes.
