

Farm Loan Group To Name Officers At Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Coos and Curry section of the Roseburg National Farm Loan association, through which Federal Land Back Loans are made, will be held in the Odd Fellows hall, Coquille, Tuesday, February 7th, at 12 o'clock, according to R. L. Strickie, secretary-treasurer.

A turkey dinner will be served by the Rebekahs followed by the business session. N. A. Ellefsen, vice-president presiding, for the purpose of electing five members to the Board of Directors, two of which are to serve three years, two for two years and one for one year. Emil R. Peterson, North Bend, will talk on "Early Day Agriculture in Coos and Curry counties." Henry DeLaney, representing the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, will give a short address. "Directors of our association," said Mr. Strickie, "recently declared a dividend of five per cent on its stock, owned by members of record November 30th, last. This dividend will go to some 300 farmers in Coos, Curry and Douglas counties, and checks will be distributed to local members at the Annual meeting. The Federal Land Bank is a 100 per cent co-operative farm lending institution founded in 1917, during the Wilson Administration, and is one in which the borrowers have a voice in management.

All the stock of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane is owned by 76 National Farm Loan Association throughout Oregon.

Washington, Idaho and Montana, which comprise the 12th District of the Farm Credit Administration. Profits of the Federal Land Bank are distributed through dividends to the National Farm Loan associations, and are passed along, also in the form of dividends, to the farmer members. Loans are made on farm property for 20 to 34 1/2 years, at a low rate of interest, with the privilege of paying them off at any time.

"The other officers of the association," continued Mr. Strickie, "are Eugene H. Fisher, Oakland, president; Juanita Burt, Roseburg, assistant secretary-treasurer; Cedric Cross, Riverton; Chas. A. Dyer, Roseburg, and Lawrence Michaels, Canyonville, directors. All members and borrowers are urged to attend the annual meeting."
