quille Post No. 965 and Laides Auxiliary will hold a card party in The Labor Temple on East Second St. The public is invited.



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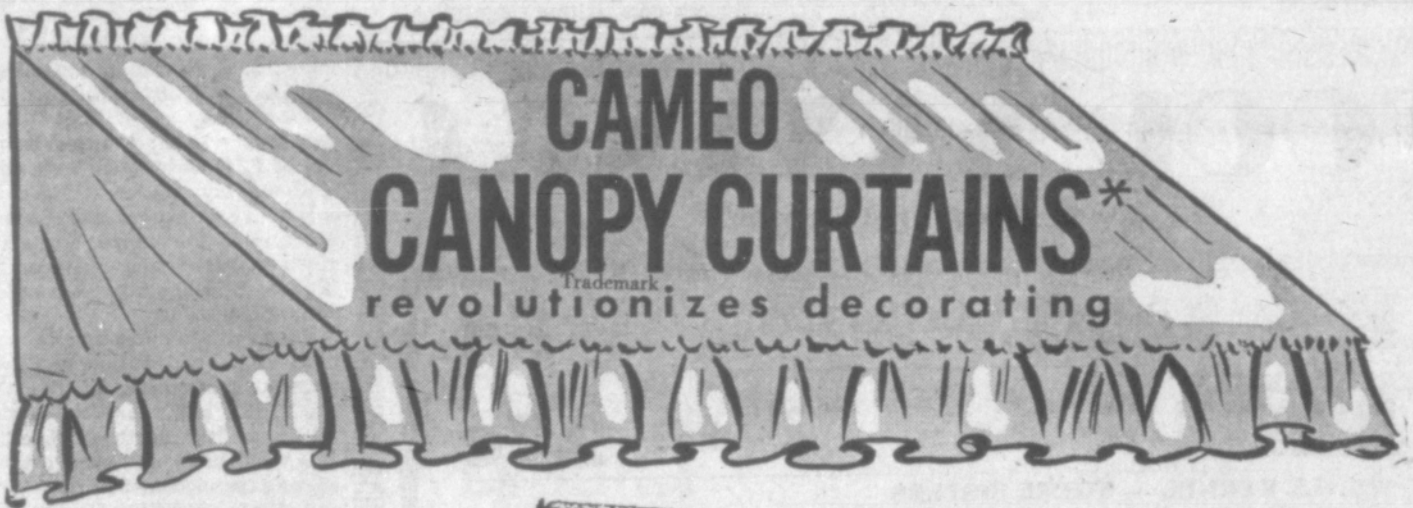
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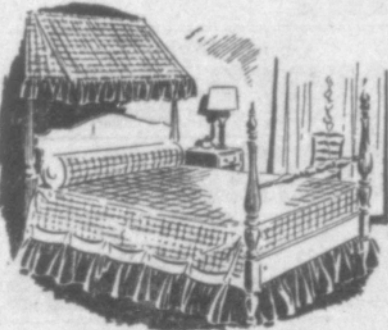
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
