

Barbara Belcher Chosen Career Girl By Business Women's Club

Miss Barbara Belcher was the Coquille high school student chosen to appear on the Business and Professional Women's club's Career Girl program this week. Miss Belcher was interviewed by Mrs. Hazel Hanna, principal of Washington school, and a member of the B. P. W. club.

Miss Belcher, who hopes to join the WAFS, the women's division of the air corps, after her graduation in June, has set her goal at becoming a pilot.

To qualify Barbara must pass a preliminary test in Coos Bay and a final test in Eugene. If she meets the requirements she will be sent to San Antonio, Texas, for eleven weeks intensive training, and it is her desire then to go to Officer Candidate Training school.

She has visions of one day serving in far away places, perhaps visiting many of the countries from which the coins in her collection came.

Barbara is a coin enthusiast and has in her possession coins from foreign lands, many of them sent to her by her uncle during the war years. She likes to swim, is

a member of the Coquille rifle club and has served as a reporter on the high school Hi-Times staff.

Her days are very full. She works part time at the North End market, going to work at 7 a. m. each morning and working until 8:30 a. m. when she goes to school. From 2 p. m. until 5:30 p. m. she again works at the market. At home, where there are six brothers and sisters, she does her share of the work.

Also appearing on the Career Girl program was Miss Mary Agnes Ainley, acting county extension agent and a newcomer to Coquille. Miss Ainley told of the requirements, the work and the advantages of her newly launched career.

The program was arranged by Mrs. William Klenz, who is chairman of the "Career Girl" project.

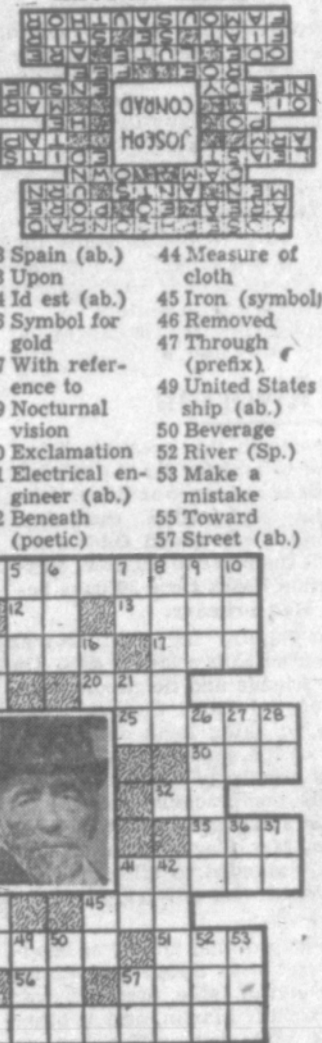
Accompanying the Pattees to Coquille will be Dr. Weaver Hess, district superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene, and Mrs. Hess.
