Myrtle Campaign To Preserve Groves To Get Stepped Up Program

Save the Myrtle Woods, Inc., at its annual meeting last week planned a stepped up campaign to seek out more stands of virgin myrtle and to present lumber companies owning such stands from cutting them.

The group plans further appeals to the lumber companies following disappointing replies to letters sent to seven of them in southwestern Oregon.

A resolution was adopted commending the bureau of land man-

agement, United States department of interior, for recommending that a 23-acre tract on the Umpqua river be reserved for scenic and recreational purposes.

New officers are M. L. Merritt, first vice president; Mrs. E. J. Willard, recording secretary, and C. P. Keyser, board of trustees, all of Portland.

Re-elected were Thorton T. Munger, president; Herman Boyer, second vice president; Milton W. Rice, treasurer; Mrs. Theodore Adams, corresponding secretary, all of Portland. Honorary vice presidents are V. V. Harpham, Roseburg; Judge Louis Felsheim, Coquille; W. L. Crissey, Brookings. Trustees are Arthur R. Kirkham and Walter E. Wilhelm, both of Portland.

The organization reviewed its major accomplishments last year, which included: Dedication of the Alfred A. Loeb state forest-park on the Chetco river; purchase of the 15-acre Millicoma tract four miles above Allegany and the 7-acre tract between the South Coquille river and the Myrtle Point-Powers highway near Gaylord with funds donated by the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, the turning over of these two tracts and the Maria C. Jackson state park to the state highway commission.

4-H News Notes From All Over Coos

March is probably the biggest planting month for home gardens. If the ground is workable, the early vegetables can be sown. Peas, successive plantings of radishes, spinach, carrots, turnips and onion sets can go in now.

I see by the papers that a few club news reporters are right on the job. All clubs should have a news reporter and keep the newspapers and the public informed about what you do at your meetings.

Farm magazines are often a good place to find topics for demonstrations, so if you are having difficulty finding a good topic, you might try some of the farming journals.

If any dairy club members need help in finding a calf, don't hesitate to let us know. We often hear

about good calves to be sold or given to 4-H'ers.

The Coos-Curry Jersey Cattle club calf award will be made this next Sunday at the Henry Schwenn farm, Bullards Route, Coquille. Next week's column will have the name of the lucky winner.

The Sears-Roebuck Foundation is again sponsoring a 4-H garden contest this year. In order to be eligible we need 30 members enrolled in the garden project and at least 20 members competing. So far we have only half the total number needed.

Those entering the contest must be enrolled in a 4-H garden project.

Each contestant is required to write a story on the topic, "Plans for my 1950 4-H Garden," and draw a sketch of the garden plan.

All garden club members who wish to enter this contest should notify the County Extension office by May 1. If enough enter to make Coos county eligible, stories and plans must be sent to the office by May 15.

To each of the writers of the best stories and plans, Sears-Roebuck Foundation will provide seeds and plants valued up to \$4.50. Receipts are not required.

Have you sent your beginning report card to the county office? If not you are not a 4-H club member.

All livestock club members—your project includes all the animals you own, so be sure to include them in your record book. The idea of the 4-H livestock project—whether it be dairy, poultry, sheep, hogs, beef, or what have you—is to build up a herd or flock. Don't forget about your older animals and just keep records on your young stock. Also remember that all animals of one type are to be entered in one book. That is, all dairy animals in one book, beef in another, and so on.

A number of 4-H clubs had window displays during National 4-H club week. The Bridge and Remote clubs had one in Trim's Service Station in Bridge. The Eat and Sew cooking club had one in Coos Bay and so did the Greenacres sewing club. Gravelford and Norway clubs had a window display in Myrtle Point.

Mail Correct Fees For License Renewals

Incorrect fees accompanying requests for a renewed driver's license are delaying renewal service, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said Friday.

In most cases, the incorrect amounts result from failure to use an application form, the secretary said. The renewal fee is \$1.25 in all cases and the application form on the back of your license card may be used when applying for renewal. In the event your license has no such form one can be picked up at any police station, sheriff's office, obtained from any driver license clerk or examiner, or from the secretary of state's office.

Renewing your driver's license is an individual matter under the state's new "staggered" system, Newberry reminded. Instead of all licenses falling due for renewal at the same time, each driver's license now expires every other year on the birthday of the holder. He advised all drivers to check the expiration date on the face of their license card to make sure they are not operating on an invalid permit.

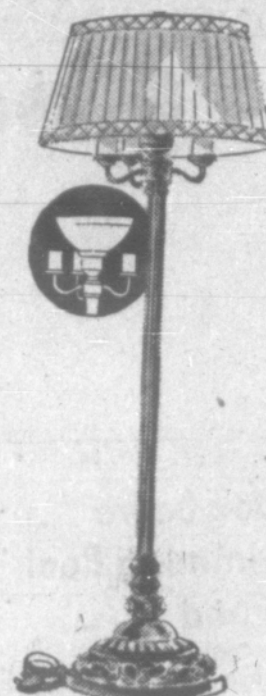

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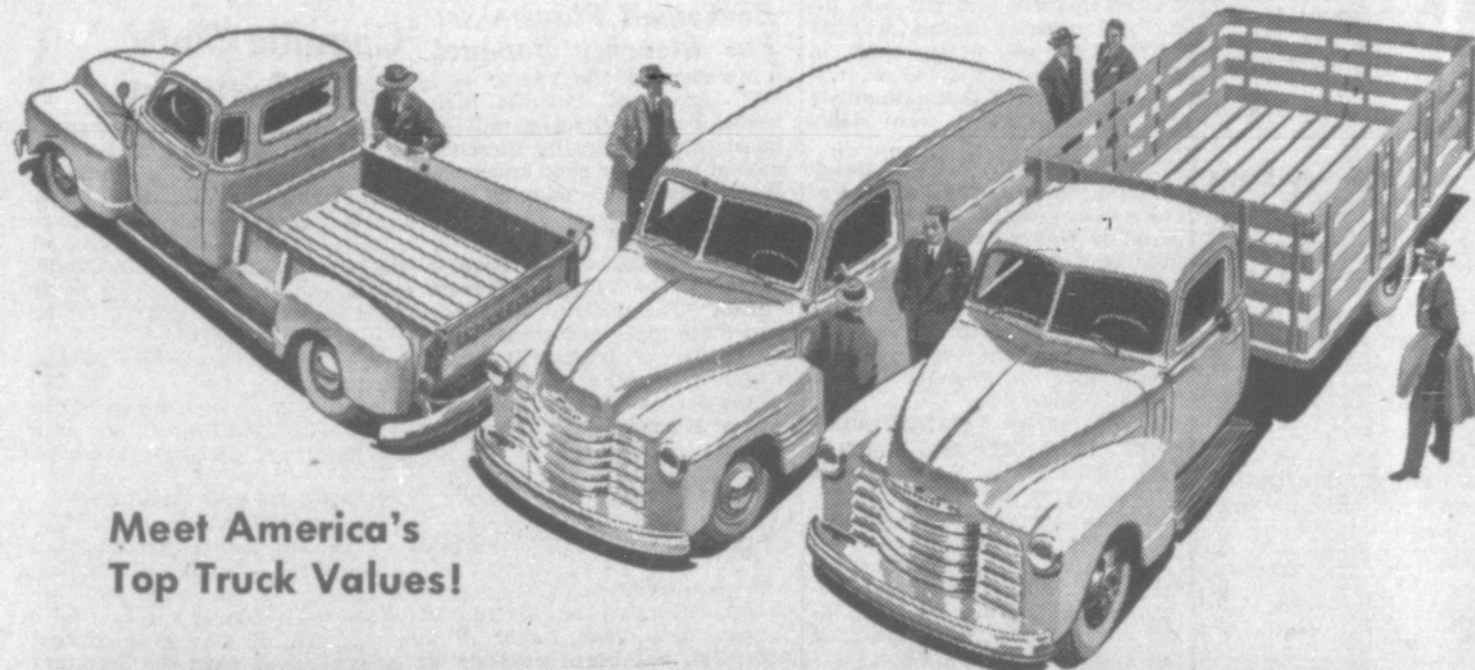

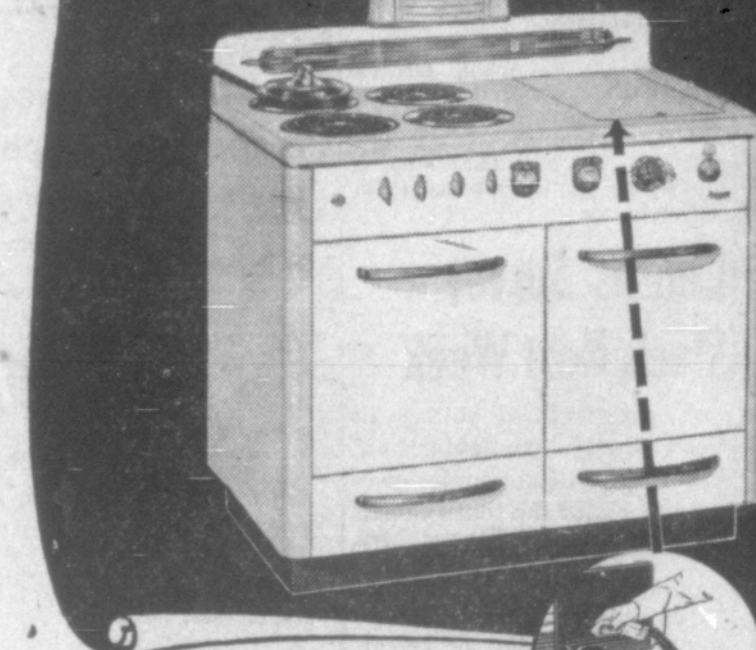
