The county agricultural agent's office received this week 1000 pounds of "School Marm" oats which will be used throughout the county for experimental purposes.

The variety, included in experiments at the Astoria experimental farm in recent years, has been highly recommended for its rust resistance qualities. It is the plan of the county department to distribute sacks of the oats to various farmers in the county who will plant it along with other varieties in order that a comparison may be made. Anyone interested in obtaining a portion of the seed is asked to contact the County agents office.
