Wednesday, May 3 is a date to be circled on your calendar. On that day the Annual Coos County Homemaker's Festival is being held at the Coquille Community Building, Coquille, Oregon. This Festival is a highlight and culmination of the Home Economics Extension work in the county during the year and is a day you will not want to miss. A good program is being planned and the Speaker will be Ava B. Milam, dean, School of Home Economics, Oregon State College. The title of her talk is, "Observations and Impressions on a Recent Trip to the Orient." Also speaking on the program will be Miss Frances Clinton, State Agent, and Mr. Frank Ballard, Associate Director of Extension, both from Oregon State College. The day for "program planning" has been changed from April 21st to April 25. All project leaders for Program Planning will want to especially note this. A letter will soon be sent out to these leaders giving further information.

An Extension bulletin 688 on "The Freezing Preservation of Fruits and Vegetables" is now available at the office. It gives the names and varieties of fruits and vegetables which can be frozen and steps in preparing for freezing.

On the calendar for freezing foods during the months of April and May are: Fruits currants, gooseberries, and strawberries. Vegetables— asparagus, peas, rhubarb, spinach and other greens.

At the unit meetings on "Frozen Meals Cooked and Uncooked" begun this last week it was decided that there is little difference between the flavor and texture of frozen foods as compared with fresh foods. Cakes especially were found to freeze very nicely. Mrs. Ray Waterman at the Prosper-Bandon Unit brought portions of three cakes which had been frozen six months. They were delicious.

At the Eastside Unit Mrs. C. W. James brought a fresh and a frozen mayonnaise cake which made a hit with unit members. This cake also freezes beautifully. Mrs. James' husband likes to take it in his lunch because it keeps so moist. The recipe for this cake is:

1 cup nuts
1 cup dates or raisins
1 cup hot water
Blend these ingredients and let stand. 1 cup sugar
1 cup mayonnaise
3 tablespoons cocoa
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Blend these ingredients together.
2 cups flour
½ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
Mix all together and bake 1 hour at 350. We guarantee you will like it.
