Extension Course On Music Starts

Maude Garnett, associate professor of music at the University of Oregon, gave the first in a series of ten lectures on Music in Coquille on Monday evening. The extension course, music 283, which can be taken for credit or audit, is being conducted at the Lincoln Elementary school, each Monday evening, between the hours of 7 and 10 p. m. 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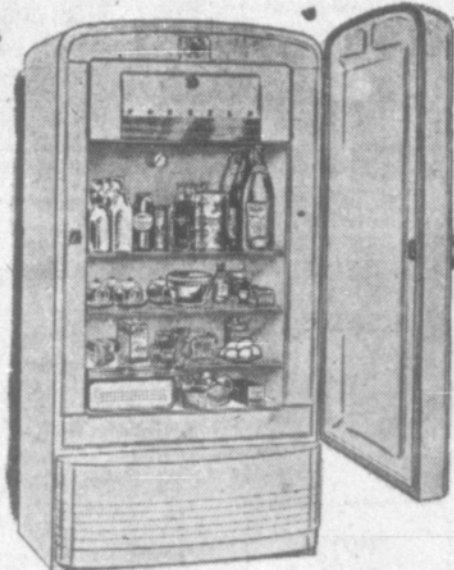
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
