Myrtle Point Basketball Coach Brings National Collegiate Fame To County

Versatile Len Rinearson, scheduled to handle coaching duties at Myrtle Point high school following his graduation in June from Oregon State college, is one of the all-round "greats" at Oregon State college.

Affectionately tabbed as "Rhino" by Oregon State rooters, Rinearson left a brilliant high school career at Oregon City high school to enter Oregon State where he had earned seven letters in varsity sports. He has played and lettered three times each in track and basketball, and was a starting left guard under the tutelage of Coach Lon Stiner in 1945.

Tall and raw-boned, Rinearson measures 6' 4" from toe to touse and weighs 210 pounds. He used his size effectively in basketball where he performed on Slats Gill's northern division co-champions in 1947-8 and on the 1948-9 Beaver squad which placed fourth in the NCAA finals at Seattle. During the basketball season just finished, Rinearson alternated as center and forward and was called

by Coach Gill, at the finish of the eastern tour of post-season games, as the outstanding man on the squad. Rinearson during that tour scored 13 to lead the Beavers to an upset of New York university in Madison Square Garden. He was noted through out the season as a talented defensive and back-board player.

His fame in basket ball is equalled by his track accomplishments. Len holds the Oregon State all-time record of throwing the discus when he hit the 150 feet mark against Oregon last spring.

While in the army in Austria during the war, Rinearson handled the duties of personal bodyguard for General Mark Clark.

Married to the former Helen Paulson of Salem, a 1948 graduate of OSC, Len is the father of a baby boy born toward the end of the basketball season this year. A good student, Rinearson has been awarded the Corvallis Elks award given annually to the "outstanding junior man at OSC." He is affiliated with Sigma Phi Epsilon social fraternity.

Coquille Relays To Be Run Friday

The annual Coquille Relays will be run at the Coquille high school athletic field Friday afternoon, April 14th. The first field event will start at 1:30. Teams representing Coquille, Myrtle Point, Coos Bay and North Bend will participate.

Three men from each school will take part in each of the field events: shotput, javelin, discus, high jump, pole vault, and broad jump.

Track events will include the shuttle hurdle, 324 yards over 5 hurdles; the 440-yard relay; the distance medley, 1/4 mile and one mile; and the sprint medley, 220-yard and 440-yard.

CHS Seniors Win Intramural Meet

Intra-mural cinder-dusters of Coquille high school held the second annual intra-mural meet at the schools athletic field Saturday afternoon, April 1st.

The senior class won the meet with a total of 82 1/2 points, followed by the sophomores with 34, the juniors with 16 1/2, while the frosh wound up with 2.

Events and winners in the field show were: shotput, Leonard Scolari, 39 ft. 8 in.; pole vault, Gene Schrag, 9 ft. 6 in.; broad jump, Buzz Oerding, 17 ft. 8 1/2 in.; discus, Jim Newton, 108 ft. 6 in.; high jump, Eddie Howe, 5 ft. 2 in.

In the track events Bill Melton captured the 100-yd. dash in 11.5 seconds; Gene Schrag broke tape first in the mile with a mark of 5 minutes 28 seconds; the sophomore class represented by Finley, Scolari, Howe and Schweinfurt raced home in the half-mile relay in minute 53 seconds; Buzz Oerding sewed up the 440 in one minute flat; Gene Schrag outran his opposition in the 880 to set a mark of 2 minutes and 3 seconds; while Buzz Oerding won the 220 event for the seniors in 38 seconds, and the senior team of Schrag, McKay, Berg and Cochran won a final victory in the mile relays in 4 minutes 26 seconds.

Roseburg Captures Three-Way Meet

The Roseburg Indians won the Coquille-Myrtle Point-Roseburg meet last Friday at Roseburg, taking top honors by a 2-point margin. The Indians finished the day's labor with 58 points, while Myrtle Point ended with 56 and Coquille finished last with 38.

VanHorn of Roseburg annexed top scoring honors with 12 1/2 points by virtue of a first in the 100-yard dash, a second in the 220-yard dash and a second in the broad jump.
