Get out your favorite flies and spinners, you ardent followers of Izaak Walton; for trout season opens Saturday and unless we have too much rain in the next couple of days, you'll find all the streams clear and those brown beauties in a receptive mood after a long, hard winter.

Down along the Rogue, we hear that Dan Wells of Myrtle Point and Roy Abbott of Coquille made catches last week-end. Roy says there is nothing like a Hildabrand half-and-half when the water is muddy. Outlook is for the water to clear in the near future, however.

HELPFUL HINT DEPARTMENT: Many a beautiful cast has been started with the intention of throwing the lead far out into the breakers only to see the sinker stop suddenly in mid-air and leave the line on the spool in a tangled mess—the so-called "bird-nest." The cause of this is an over-running spool which means that the spool is paying out more line than the flying sinker requires. Result—the loose line will get reversely wound on the spool and cause the backlash. In casting, the sinker is losing speed rapidly due to air resistance and the pull of the line, whereas the spool, running in almost frictionless bearings, will keep on running at almost the original speed. The only remedy is to reduce the speed of the spool by thumbing and letting the spool pay out only as much line as is required by the sinker. This proper method of thumbing might seem difficult to the beginner, but by watching the line as it leaves the spool and starting to thumb as soon as loose line develops, backlash will be eliminated. Another point is to wind the line evenly and tightly on the spool, as a loose line will dig in and cause backlash. A short cast to wet the line before casting is also helpful. Never dip your reel in the water. You will only get the inside of the reel wet and very little of the line.
