Chief F. Puumala recruiter in charge of the local navy recruiting station announces the enlistment in the regular navy of Elmer Rodger Alford who has resided in Coquille

Coos Bottleneck To Be Solved

The Coos Bay - North Bend bottleneck on the Oregon coast highway is to be ended by a project for which bids will be received at the April 25th meeting. It calls for improvement of Front street in Coos Bay to serve as the northbound route of the highway, involving its reconstruction from Fir avenue on through to Ferry avenue on the south; widening Broadway from Elrod avenue to Ingersoll avenue; and relocation of 0.43 mile of the Southern Pacific tracks to make room for the new highway. Upon completion, scheduled for August 31, 1951, the improvement will fit in with recent improvements to provide a four-lane traffic way between the two cities.

Coquille Boy Seriously Hurt By Stray Bullet

Delbert Christianson is recovering at home in Coquille after having been shot by a stray bullet Friday near Myrtle Creek where he was a guest of his cousin Edwin Kuntz.

The boys had spent the first part of last week prospecting in the hills back of Days Creek and returned home to the Drive-In Market Thursday night.

Friday a group of boys went to the river to play baseball on the flat land there and young Christianson was hit by the bullet. None of the boys could ascertain where the shot came from.

At the Myrtle Creek hospital X-rays revealed that the bullet was lodged in the thigh bone and was of a larger caliber than a .22, probably shot from a pistol.

The bullet was left in the bone as doctors decided it would be more injurious to the bone to remove it. The boy was treated first at the Myrtle Creek hospital and removed to the hospital at Coquille Saturday, when his mother, Mrs. Pearl Christianson came in response to a call from the Kuntz'.

State police who are investigating the accident have not as yet found a lead as to its origin.

Popular Bulletin On Oregon Trees To Be Reprinted

An O.S.C. extension bulletin, "Trees to Know in Oregon," is evidently on its way to a top place on the "best seller" list of publications issued by the college.

Within a month after an initial printing of 15,000 copies was made available, the supply was almost exhausted. Plans have now been made to reprint the bulletin and this time 20,000 copies will be run off, announces J. W. Scheel, assistant to the extension service director.

almost one-quarter of the national timber resources.

The publication was published cooperatively with the Oregon State Board of Forestry. Many of the drawings were made by Hugh Hayes, forestry board civil engineer.

Journalism Dean Named At Oregon

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—Appointment of Dr. Gordon A. Sabine to head the University of Oregon journalism school is announced by President H. K. Newburn.

Dr. Sabine, a member of the journalism faculty for the past two years, was appointed dean of the school and associate professor, succeeding Dean Clifford F. Weigle, who will leave in June to become associate director of the Institute for Journalistic Studies at Stanford university. The new appointment is subject to confirmation by the state board of higher education.

Before coming to Oregon, the new dean was a member of journalism faculties of the Universities of Wisconsin, Minnesota, and

Kansas. He received his baccalaureate and master's degrees in journalism from the University of Wisconsin, and his doctorate in 1949 from the University of Minnesota.

A background of varied professional work on newspapers and magazines has been experienced by Dr. Sabine.

In the magazine field, Dr. Sabine was for a year editor of the Wisconsin Wildlife. He has writ-

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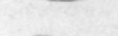
