Intramural Banquet will Feature Award To Outstanding High School Athlete

A busy week in the realm of intra-mural sports at Coquille high school is set for next week with the annual banquet Thursday headlining the events, Fred C. Adams, director, announced.

Slated for the evening will be the presentation of the Coquille Valley Sentinel cup for the outstanding intra-mural athlete of the year. The cup will be presented by R. T. (Dick) Slater, chairman of the Coquille school board.

Other events scheduled will be the second annual rifle tournament under the management of Max Clausen which will start Saturday in the basement of the Community Building, the beginning of the softball tournament, the end of the volleyball race; and start of the badminton tourney.

A feature of the annual banquet will be a talk by Dr. Paul R. Waaske, director of intra-mural

athletics at the University of Oregon.

Ray Hunsaker, superintendent of schools will present awards to first place winners of the second annual intra-mural track meet, while Ernest R. James, principal, will present volley ball awards.

Honored guests will be Ralph Stuller, Editor of the Coquille Valley Sentinel, Chuck Pritchard, Sentinel sports editor; Eugene Briggs, Coos Bay Times sports editor and Fabian Nelson, successor to Adams.

More than 100 plates of food will be prepared under the direction of Mrs. Malone and Mrs. Frances Coleman assisted by girls in the school's home economics classes. Entertainment is being arranged by Buzz Oerding who alleges a fine program will greet the large attendance.

The rifle tourney rules require that each boy will bring his own ammunition and .22 rifle. Telescope sights will not be permitted. All boys entering are asked to sign for competition today.

The opening of the softball tourney saw Atkinson's freshmen defeat Shaw's sophomores 7-6. Play was spotted with early season errors. Bob Purvis was winning pitcher while losing hurler was Jesse Thurman. Weather permitting a game will be played each noon at Fortier field, Adams said.

The sophomores won the intra-mural volley ball tourney as Fish's team thumped Clayton's 15-10. Awards will be made at the banquet. First and second place teams will travel to Coos Bay Wednesday to play the Marshfield first and second place teams.

Badminton got underway Wednesday will Larry Wilson defeating Rod Noah and Bob Pingleton sinking Jim Kay. Intra-mural tennis will follow the badminton tourney.

Two horseshoe courts are under construction by Charles Train and Jim McCurdy and will be available for a tourney soon.

LET'S TALK FISHING...



Fishing was picking up this week. Reports Monday and Tuesday were such that a great big exodus is to be expected from Coquille south to Gold Beach.

With some of the poorest early season fishing on record tallied up by even the most stalwart of rods-men, the reports now coming in are pretty good. Bert Folsom and party of four caught six salmon with the heaviest being 26 pounds and the smallest down to 12 pounds. Dr. and Mrs. C. G. Stem lauded two, one at 26 pounds and one at 22 pounds. At Scott's lodge Dick Carmichael got a 25 pounder one week, and a 35 pounder this week.

Not much has been said about Floras Lake, that gem of the wildwoods down alongside the Pacific and near Langlois, but Alex Kreick is telling how he had the good luck to bring home a near limit of large 12-inch trout last Sunday from the lake. And he said that people down there tell him that when the May flies are hatching, trout

fishing is really good.

Wherever you go now you hear a fish story. Joseph Yost of Earl Carroll's has one, too. It's about the time he hit it rich on the bay and came back to Coquille with over a hundred pounds of striped bass, and nearly knocked Father Lessing's eyes out when he phoned him and said he had a fish to give him. "Buuuut," said Fr. Lessing, as he peered at the huge five foot striper Yost had picked out for the Episcopal vicar, "there are only four in our family, and that's a lot of fish." Incidentally, though Yost is reputed to be quite a man with the reel and rod, he doesn't eat fish. Reminds us of Bill Ortman of the Sentinel staff, Butch Briner, Penny Sturdivant, and numerous other anglers around here who like to catch 'em, but don't eat them.

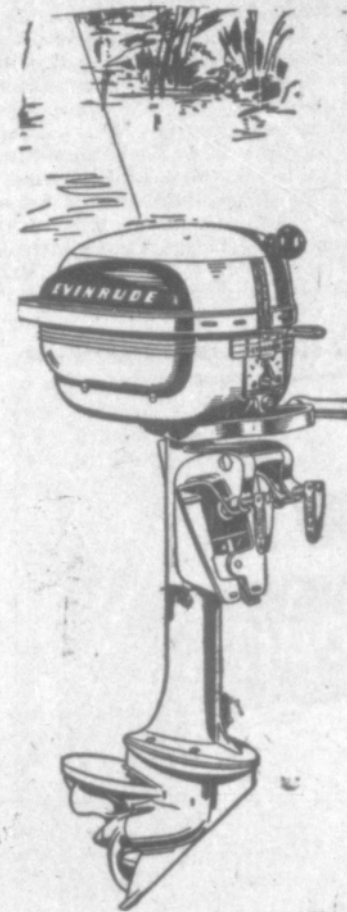

Next week we will have some boiled down facts from the 1950 Angling Rules and pass them on to you. It's always a good idea to know which stream is legal and which isn't.

We just called down to Gold Beach and talked to Mr. Scott at the lodge and here is the latest news; the water is clearing rapidly and is much improved from the last few days. Several fish were caught Thursday and Monday's catch was the best since the season opened. Mr. Scott said that if you were not sure of catching your limit by noon that you can get nice fresh lunches at the lodge.

The water at the bar isn't so rough today and the prospects are good for a nice run of salmon on the evening tide. The prospects for good salmon fishing are the best since the season opened. It might be chilly though and Thornton's Sporting Goods store in Myrtle Point has some dandy sports heaters that really keep you warm and comfortable. The salmon seem to have an eye open for the copper spinner the last few days so you might find it wise to have a couple of these in your tackle box.

While you fellows are fishing the Rogue this week-end, don't be alarmed if you see something coming up the river like a PT boat. It will be George McClellan with his new twenty-two and a half horse power Evinrude motor he purchased this week from Thornton's Sporting Goods store in Myrtle Point. Fellows, did you know that the largest Striped Bass ever caught weighed fifty-seven pounds? It was caught in 1944 by J. Sylvester at Narragansett, R. I., and was landed on twenty pound test line. This whopper was 55 1/2 inches long and had a girth of 34 1/2 inches.
