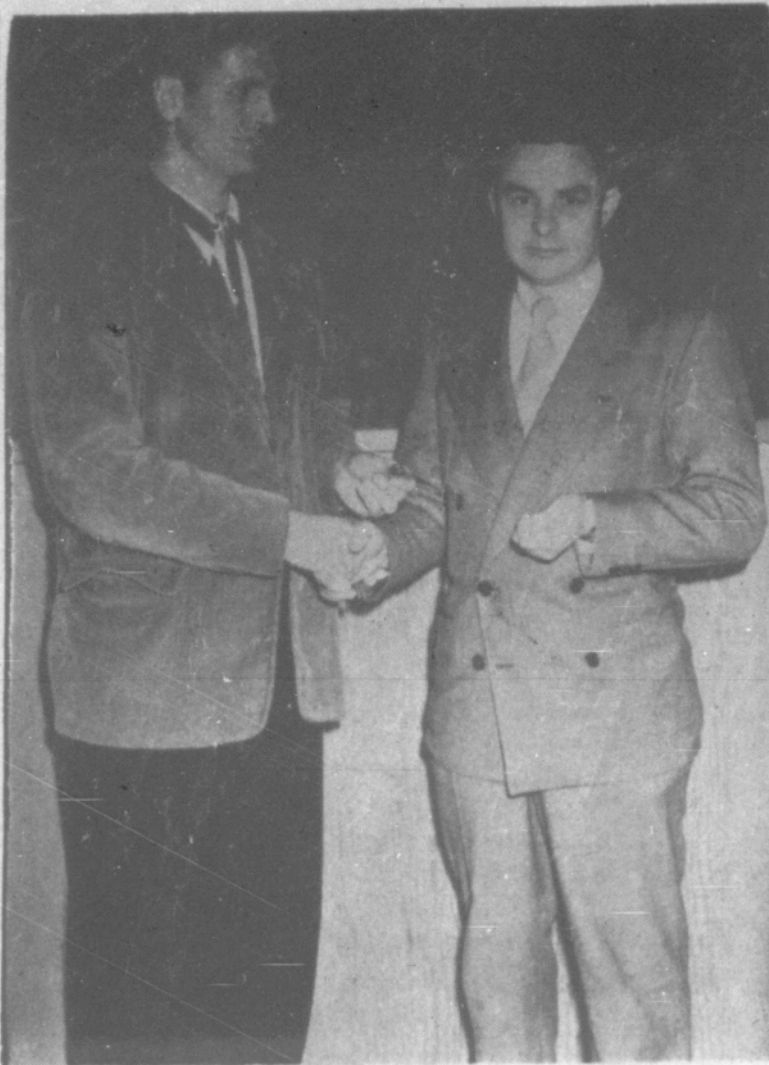

PLAY WRITING CONTEST OPEN TO COOS 4-H CLUBS

4-H club members of the county are being given an opportunity to participate in a 4-H Playwriting contest, according to Walter G. Schroeder, county extension agent. The first place winner will be awarded a scholarship to 4-H club summer school and will have the play broadcast over radio station KOAC. Second place to eighth place winners will receive cash awards and the plays will be broadcast over radio station KOAC.

The requirements for the contest are as follows: Theme—An interesting story of 4-H club work, not necessarily true but logical; characters: at least three, not more than seven; playing time: at least 12 minutes; form: correct form will be sent to play writer on request. All entries must be typed. The state-wide contest closes on May 15. All entries must be in the mail by midnight of that date.

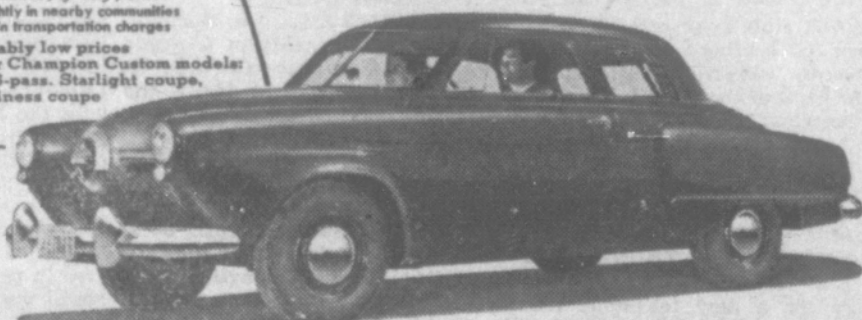
