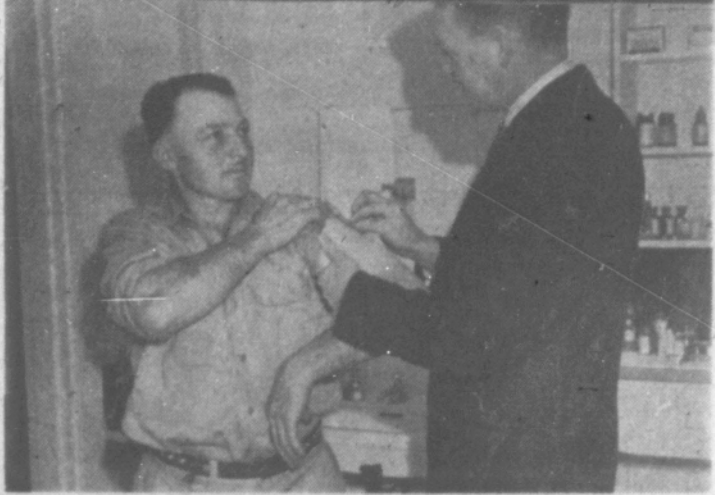


They Make News

Dorcas Group Work On Quilt, Towels

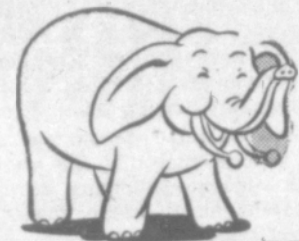
