

## Savings Bonds Sales Are Good

A sharp upturn in sales of U. S. Savings Bonds was marked in April in the state of Oregon, according to E. C. Sammons, state savings bonds committee chairman. Private individuals in this state bought a total of \$3,765,892 worth of Uncle Sam's bonds, with \$2,710,479 being invested in the small E bonds. These figures are taken from the latest report of the Portland branch of the Federal Reserve bank.

According to J. W. Asplund, county chairman, the people of Coos county purchased a total of \$50,379, of which \$50,205 was in E bonds. He expressed the hope that local people will take the time during the Drive period to carefully analyze their own financial situation with an eye toward the future value of a reserve in savings bonds or other types of savings programs, and will act accordingly.

## Father Lessing Talks To PEO

## Legion Auxiliary Explains Purpose Of Legion Poppy

Mrs. Fred Kunz, poppy chairman for Coquille unit of the American Legion auxiliary, states the purposes of the poppy program as follows:

It gives the disabled veteran employment; restores his self-respect; keeps his mind and hands occupied during convalescence; gives him the status he so much desires with his family; keeps alive his memory in the hearts of all people; and provides the necessary funds for rehabilitation and child welfare.

Thus, the American Legion program re-inspires patriotism, rehabilitates the disabled, and cares for the needy children of veterans. These Memorial poppies are made of red crepe paper, by hand, by disabled veterans in 111 hospitals and workrooms in over 44 states, and the veterans receive pay for each poppy made. The materials are furnished to them free of any charge.

The instruction is in the hands of volunteer workers of the American Legion auxiliary. The outside helpers are the poppy chairman, the auxiliary workers who sell them on the streets, and the thousands of others who buy them on the streets. The benefits are not in money alone, but in dreary hours lightened by useful occupation filled with new hope and courage. Every penny of the proceeds is used for the needy veteran and his family.

## Weyerhaeuser Makes IWA An Offer

Weyerhaeuser Timber Company announced today that, before strike action, it had made an offer to International Woodworkers of America (C.I.O.) which, measured by the amount of benefits to the employees and cost to the company, was comparable to any of the settlements made by the union with other employers in the lumber industry in the Pacific Northwest.

The company's offer was made on Friday, May 12. It was rejected by the union on Saturday, May 13, with the statement that while the offer might require minor adjustments, it was useless to enter into further negotiations regarding them until such time as the company agreed to a union shop. The company has had a maintenance of membership provision in all of its contracts where the union is eligible for any type of union security provision.

The company's offer consisted of a company-paid pension plan, group life insurance, and non-in-

dustrial health and accident insurance, together with three paid holidays. The pension plan would provide a \$100 a month pension at age 65 with 26% years of continuous service and basic earnings of \$3000 per year during the last ten years of employment. Company-paid group life insurance would average more than \$3500 per employee and the non-occupational accident and health benefits would average approximately \$40 per week for 26 weeks.

As a part of the company's offer it dropped all company demands previously presented to the union.
