Pertinent reports will be given Friday morning regarding funds for one of five chosen delegates to the Tri-centennial convention of the Associated Country Women of the World at Copenhagen, Denmark, in September; the financial status and developments on the proposed Azalea House, cooperative house on the O.S.C. campus, and progress of the study of tooth decay in Oregon.

Mrs. Earl Meeker, Wasco county, chairman of the scholarship committee, will present the annual council award of \$50 to the O.S.C. senior in home economics who stands high in scholarship, is outstanding in campus activities, partially self-supporting and interested in becoming a home demonstration agent.

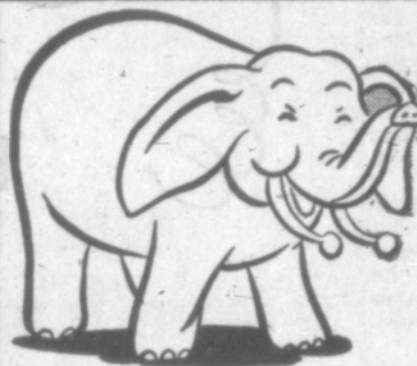
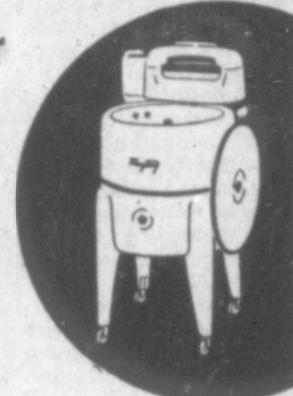
