NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 8C, Coos County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL ELECTION of said district will be held at Washington School on the 28th day of June, 1950, between the hours of 2:00 o'clock and 8:00 o'clock p. m. Standard Time or 3:00 o'clock and 9:00 o'clock p. m. Daylight-Saving Time for the purpose of voting on the budget for the fiscal school year, beginning July 1, 1950 and ending June 30, 1951, hereinafter set forth, and to vote on the proposition of levying a district tax which will exceed the 6% limitation as set by law. An open hearing to discuss said budget will be held at Washington School at 8:00 o'clock p. m. Standard Time or 9:00 o'clock p. m. Daylight-Saving Time on the same day.

The reasons for exceeding the 6% limitation are: (1) To increase teacher and other employees' salaries, (2) To pay for additional needed teachers, (3) To pay for additional needed equipment, supplies and improvements due to increased number of students, (4) To pay sewer assessments.
