## Farm Churned Butter

Farm churned butter continued on the down trend during 1949. However, it is still a sizable amount, representing about one-sixth of the total butter produced in the nation. The total amount of farm churned butter in 1949 amounted to 283 million pounds. This is five per cent less than a year earlier. Farm butter production reached its peak around the beginning of this century. Present production represents about one-fourth the amount produced at that time. Texas leads all states in farm butter production. The other high producing states are also in the south and southeastern portion of the nation.

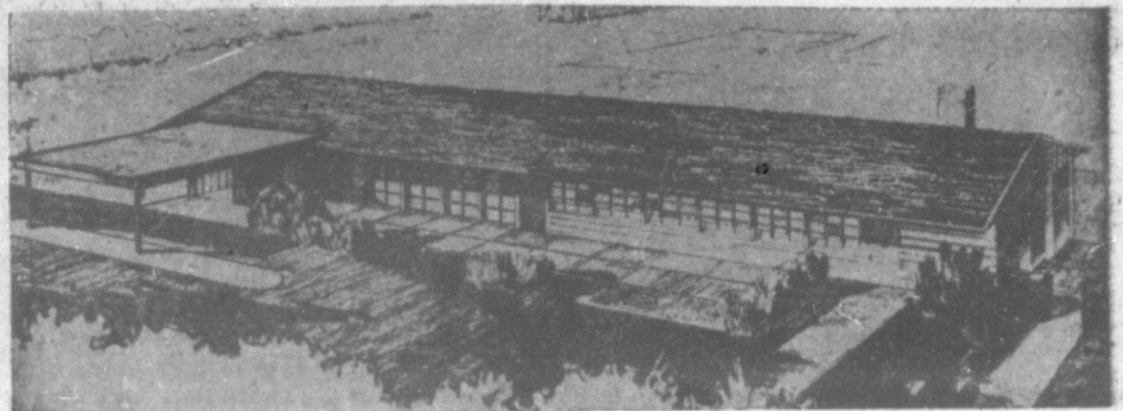
## Western States Dairy Cows

**Average High In Milk Production**  
California led the nation during 1949 on the average amount of milk produced per cow. The average was 7,310 pounds of milk. New York was second where the average amount produced was 7,210 pounds. The state of Washington ranked third for the nation with the average amount of milk produced per cow at 6,560 pounds. According to records available these are all time high records, especially for California and Washington.

In Oregon the average dairy cow produced 5,850 pounds of milk

during 1949. This is the highest production for this state except for 1947 when the average production was slightly higher at 5,890 pounds of milk.

The western region of the United States has the highest average production of milk per cow of any region in the United States. The next highest region was across the United States in the North Atlantic states where the average production was 6,240 pounds of milk for each dairy cow.
