Farm Housing Loans Available For Coos Folk

The farm housing program, authorized by recent act of Congress, is now under way in Coos county. Applications for loans to build or repair farm houses and other farm buildings are being received at the Farmers Home Administration county office at Eugene, according to William E. Walsh, FHA county supervisor.

Loans may run from five to thirty-three years at four per cent interest and can be made to farm owners who cannot obtain farm housing loans from their banks or other sources. County Supervisor Walsh said. All applications are reviewed by the local three-member FHA county committee.

The Housing Act is authorized for a four-year period of loan making. The appropriation for the current year is \$27,000,000 for the entire country.

County Supervisor Walsh predicted that most loans will go to farmers with farm earning and other income enough to repay the loan plus interest without further help from the government. Loans will be for repairs and remodeling as well as for new construction.

Applicants may apply at the FHA office for loans on Mondays in Room 9, Postoffice building, Eugene, from 8:30 to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m.

Bishop Kennedy On "Church Of Air"

Bishop Gerald Kennedy of Portland, Oregon, will preach on "How to be Rewarded" over the Columbia Broadcasting System's network program, the "Church of the Air," Sunday, June 11.

The service will originate in the studios of Station KIRO, Seattle, Washington, and will be heard from 7:30 to 8:00 a. m. Pacific Daylight Time. KOIN of Portland, Oregon, will carry it at the same time; and on KDSH, Boise, Idaho, which broadcasts direct from the network, it will be heard from 8:30 to 9:00 a. m. Mountain Standard Time.

Music for Bishop Kennedy's service will be provided by the choir of First Methodist church, Seattle, Mr. Don Wageman, director.

Bishop Kennedy is the youngest of the bishops of The Methodist Church, having been consecrated to the office in 1948 while he was still forty. He supervises Methodist churches in Washington, Oregon and Idaho. Before this he served churches in San Jose and Palo Alto, California, and in Lincoln, Nebraska. He is the author of six books and has appeared on the platforms of several universities on endowed lectureships.

Vacation Bible School Planned By Lutherans

A daily vacation Bible school has been planned by the Coquille Lutheran church for the benefit of all youngsters in Coquille and vicinity June 12 to 23. The school will begin at 9:00 a. m. each morning and will be dismissed at 11:30 a. m.

The period of Bible study is being conducted on a non-denominational basis and all children who are interested are invited to attend. Enrollment is being confined to children from the ages of four to twelve inclusive.

At the close of the Bible school on June 28 a program will be presented by the children of the school for the benefit of parents and friends.

There will be no admission or tuition fee. Daily offerings will be received to help defray the expenses of the school.

School Meeting Set For June 19th

June 19, is the annual school meeting date for all schools in the county except the two Union High schools in which the law specifies one week later.

In two zones there will be directors elected for the Rural School board. In Zone E, the name of W. R. Davenport, incumbent and chairman of the Rural School board, will appear on the ballot. This zone includes the following local districts: Myrtle Point, Fairview and Riverside.

In Zone A the name of Mrs. J. R. McMahan of Powers will appear on the ballot. This is the office which has been held by Ivan Laird, Sitkum. The districts included in this zone are: Districts 31, Powers; 45C, Allegany; 77C, Bridge; 2C, Broadbent; 36, Coos River; 32, Dora; 47, Etalka; 27, McKinley; 50, Remote; 65, Sitkum; 71, Aldercrest, and 34, Catching Creek.

For the Non High School board, Zone II will elect a director. The name of Mrs. Ida Linder, incumbent, will appear on the ballot. The districts in Zone II are as follows: 12C, Sumner; 34C, Allegany, and 49, Eastside.

Facts About The Strike AT COOS BAY LUMBER CO.

1. The Coos Bay Lumber Co. repudiated its agreement made before members of the Northwest Regional Negotiating Committee in Portland May 12 granting UNION SHOP to Local 7-116, IWA-CIO.

2. The Union Committee has exhausted every possible means to reach a satisfactory settlement of the UNION SHOP issue. Many meetings were held. The Union called in the services of the U. S. CONCILIATION SERVICE to assist in negotiations.

3. Contrary to the company's statement in the press, the employees overwhelmingly by secret ballot voted to strike on June 1 if the company failed to grant UNION SHOP.

4. A UNION SHOP is essential to stable labor-management relations. Under UNION SHOP all workers share equally in the responsibilities of the union. A UNION SHOP would provide that all employees become members of the union 30 days from date of employment.

5. Every lumber operation under contract with the I.W.A. in the Pacific Northwest, with the exception of Weyerhaeuser and Coos Bay Lumber Co., contains a UNION SHOP.

Every operation in the Coos Bay area is under UNION SHOP except Coos Bay Lumber Co.

WHY SHOULD COOS BAY LUMBER CO. BE GRANTED SPECIAL FAVORITISM?

6. The company's offer would require only new employees join the union. Present employees who are not members would continue to enjoy the many benefits which the union has gained for which they would contribute nothing.

7. The company is insisting upon protecting a small minority of "free riders" who are directly responsible for the strike.

Every American citizen's sense of justice dictates that such a condition is one which is greatly unfair and one of rank discrimination.

The Union stands ready to meet at any time to settle the dispute.
