Wagon Road Group Name New Officers

The Coos Bay Wagon Road association, holding its annual meeting at McKinley grange hall recently, re-elected Martin Steckel of Sumner as its president and decided to continue to work for improvement of the road from the Douglas county line to Sumner and on towards Coos Bay.

Ross Youngblood, district forester for the federal Bureau of Land Management, brought an announcement from Dan Goldy, regional administrator, that the BLM intends to improve the wagon road as soon as a few details can be worked out. This project will start near the Douglas county line and go towards Sumner, but the exact amount of roadway to be included has not been decided, Youngblood said.

Other officers elected are vice-president, James Harrison, and secretary-treasurer, Verd Smith. Both live at Sumner.

Committeemen were named from the various communities. In the following list, the second man for each community is the alternate:

F. R. Bull Office Nears Completion

When the new F. R. Bull Real Estate and Insurance office on Hall street is completed a dream of some years standing will be realized.

When Bull purchased the property adjoining the Southwestern Motor building in 1943 it was with the idea of building an office at that location. In 1945 plans were drawn up and everything was set to go ahead with the building, but materials during wartime were practically unobtainable. So it was not until this year that the original plans were dug out and the work started.

The new building, which is nearing completion, contains three offices. The real estate office will be on the north side, the insurance office, the center, and the justice court room on the south side. The courtroom will have a private entrance so that those having business with the judge will not have to go through the other offices.

An inter-communication system is being installed between the three offices and the residence in the rear. Something different in office heating will be the butane gas-panel ray heat.

The only change to the residence necessitated by the office addition, was the moving of the door and windows from the east side to the south side.

Aug. 8, 1949. Before entering the Navy he was graduated from Myrtle Point high school at Myrtle Point.

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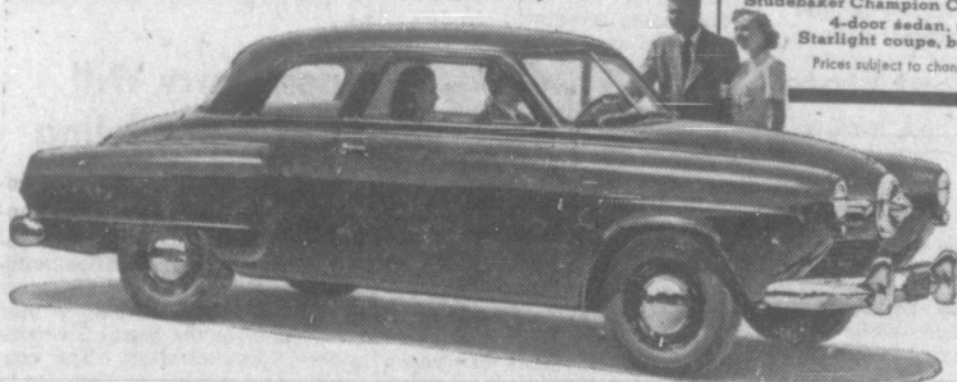
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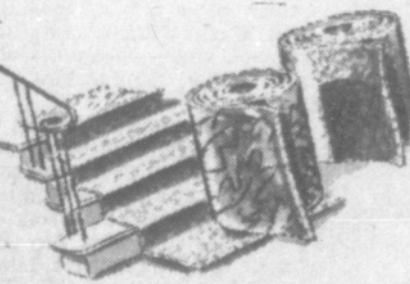

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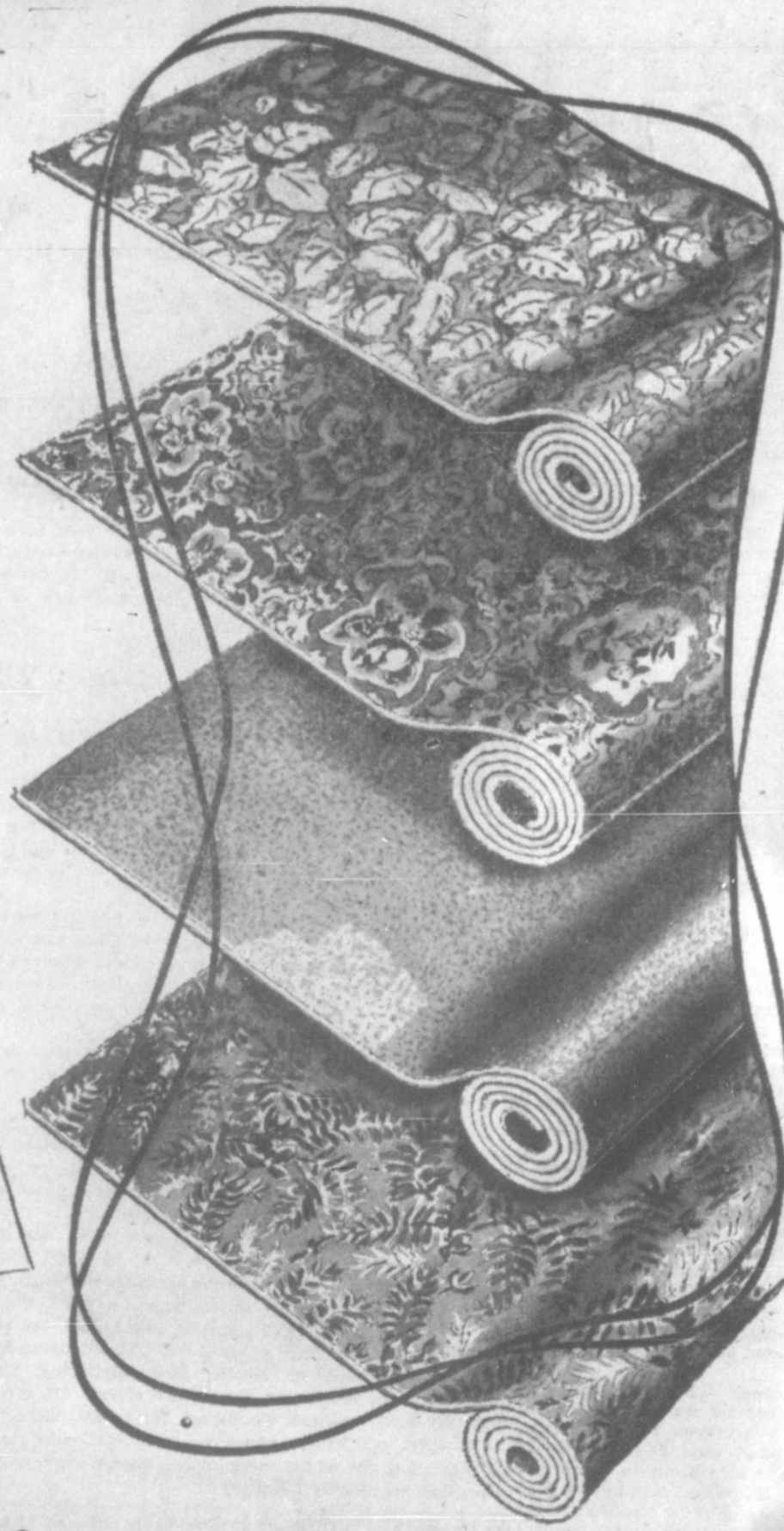
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
