Cheese Is Ideal For Adding To Meals During the Month of June, Dairy Time

DAIRY MONTH CHEESE SPECIALS

June is Dairy Month — and a favorite dairy product for year-round good meals is cheese. Cheese is one of those wholesome good foods that add substance, flavor and nutritive value to meals. Cheese adds zip and variety to a dull dish. And there are such a variety of cheeses that even the most particular eater can find one to suit his taste.

Here in Oregon we are hearty cheese eaters — which is as it should be, for our state is famed for its golden Cheddar cheese, creamy cottage cheese and pungent flavored Blue cheese. These three varieties of cheese will add flavor and zest to your June menus. Blue cheese makes delicious spreads or dips to serve with crisp crackers or potato chips. Blue cheese is a perfect complement to summer fruits on a dessert tray. It makes salad dressings men love — and does wonderful things for broiled hamburgers and steaks!

Cottage cheese is a summer salad favorite — it combines perfectly with fresh fruit and vegetables — and makes good salad dressings, too. But cottage cheese is also a tasty addition to casserole dishes, which are ideal for summer porch suppers or backyard barbecues.

Our favorite Cheddar cheese makes numerous good things to eat. For example, a piping hot cheese bread makes a flavorful accompaniment for cool summer salads and appetizing casseroles.

Blue Cheese Bunburgers

Broil hamburgers on broiler pan in oven until hamburger is done. Then spread each hamburger with Blue Cheese Mix and broil just long enough to heat the cheese. For the mix, blend 1/4 cup butter and 2 tablespoons crumbled Blue cheese. Extra good for that backyard barbecue.

Noodle Cheese Casserole

(Serves 6)

6-oz. package noodles
2 Tbsp. flour
3/4 to 1 tsp. salt
Pepper
1 cup sour cream
1 cup sieved cottage cheese
1 Tbsp. grated onion
Cook noodles in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and rinse well. Mix flour, salt and pepper in bowl. Add sour cream and stir until smooth. Fold in cottage cheese. Add noodles and onion. Mix well. Turn into but-

tered shallow baking dish. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in 350 degree F., oven for 20 minutes until brown.

Cheese Biscuit Rolls

2 cups flour
3 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup milk
4 Tbsp. butter, melted
1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
Sift dry ingredients together, work in butter. Add milk. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness. Spread with melted butter and cheese. Roll like a jelly roll, then slice. Bake on a buttered baking sheet in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 15 minutes.

You Can't Stop As Fast As You Think

The "dime" on which the average car can stop from a speed of 30 miles an hour would have to be 80 feet wide, the secretary of state's traffic safety division pointed out today.

The division said too many Oregon drivers are forgetting there are three separate actions that must take place before a car can be brought to a stop from any given speed. First, the driver has to see and recognize the need to stop. After he does that, there's the half second or more interval called "reaction time" before he moves his foot from the gas pedal, and finally he applies the brakes. All this time, until the brakes finally stop the car, the driver is moving toward the thing he doesn't want to hit.

This means the average driver can stop an average car on dry level pavement in the following distances:

At 20 miles an hour—43 feet (including 22 feet of reaction time).

At 30 miles an hour—80 feet (33 feet of reaction time).

At 40 miles an hour—128 feet (44 feet of reaction time).

At 50 miles an hour—186 feet (55 feet of reaction time).

The faster you go the longer it takes, safety officials said, because a law of nature steps in. The energy packed into an object in motion increases approximately as the square of the increase in speed, which means that the faster you drive, the longer it takes for

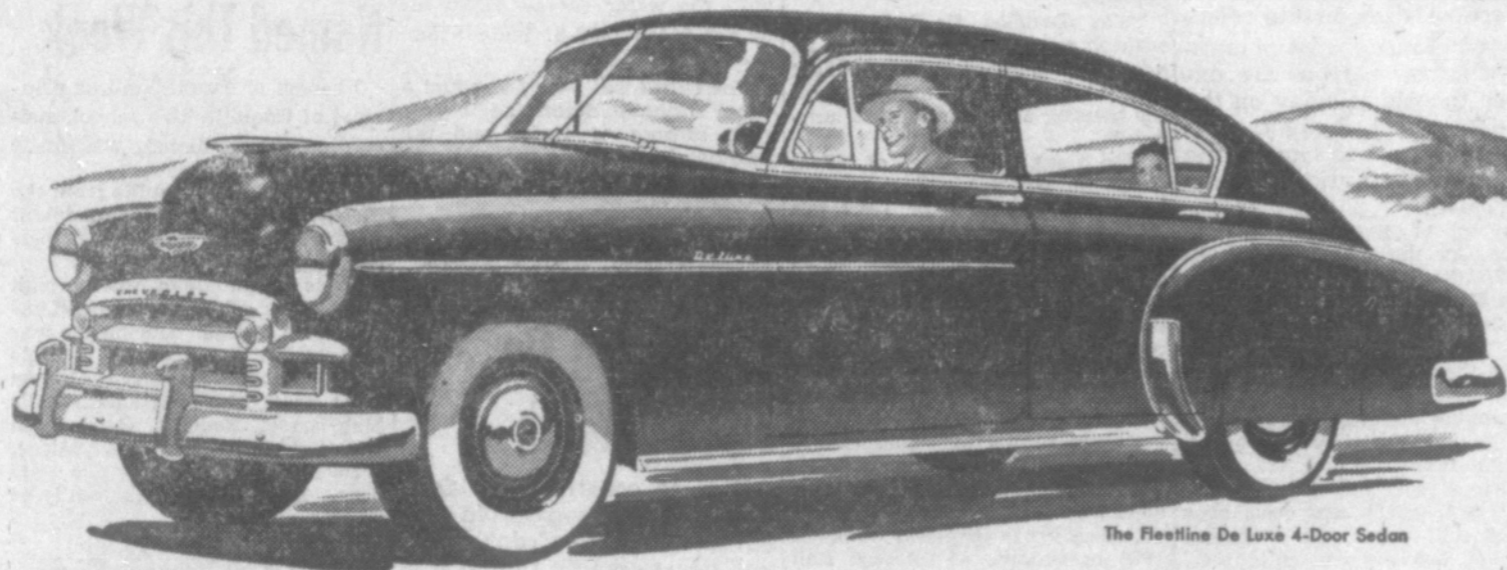
