

Summer Playground Program Underway Youngsters Urged To Sign Up Now

Coquille's Summer Playground program which is sponsored by the Coquille Park Commission and under the direction of Fabian Nelson and Dena Pierce got under way Monday, June 19th, with a big bang. The program is operating five days a week from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon for the younger age groups at the Washington school grounds under Mrs. Pierce and the older groups under Mr. Nelson at the Coquille high school.

The Washington school group with ages from six to twelve have a morning full of activities which include croquet, horseshoes, table tennis, sandboxes, rings, slides, teeters, and the use of the small gym for indoor activities in inclement weather. A full schedule is planned for the entire week and all children desiring something to do are urged to attend.

At the high school, Mr. Nelson conducts a weekly schedule also that takes into consideration the interests of all the youngsters from grade six and up. Several tournaments are planned throughout the summer in handball, tennis, golf, horseshoes, badminton, croquet, table tennis and softball. It is the desire of the playground to contact all those boys interested in playing in a summer league. If

any youngster likes the game and wants to play, now is the time to sign up at the playground and get on a team.

Another feature of the program will be an Arts and Craft club for the young airplane builder, boat builder, and soap carver. Come on down and see what the playgrounds have to offer you if you are one of Coquille's younger set and need something to do during the day.

White Twirls Fortiemen To 5-2 Win Reedsport Bats Silenced With Two Hits

Behind two-hit pitching by Don White, Bill Fortier's Coquille Loggers treated Coos county baseball fans to an outstanding exhibition of the national pastime when they defeated the visiting Reedsport nine at Fortier Field Sunday afternoon by a score of 5-2.

White set down the first three men who faced him in the top of the first inning, and Hanaska, after giving up a double to Dave Douglas during Coquille's turn at the plate, did the same thing to the next three Loggers.

Reedsport jumped into the lead for the only time in the game in the first of the second when they coupled an error, a sacrifice and a single to score.

But the big bats of the Loggers started to speak in the bottom of the same inning and by the time the thunder had died down, Coquille held a three to one lead. Stewart, first man up, singled and went to second on an error. Then Goodman singled, sending Stewart to third. Moments later he stole home to score the first Logger run. Goodman stole second while Stewart was racing home, and Salisbury

sent him on home with a sharp single. Tommy Hawkins then grounded out as Salisbury stole second and pitcher Don White drove him on around with a hard-hit single. Dave Douglas then grounded out, pitcher to first, Marchand drew a walk and Forkner flied out to retire the side with three runs scored on four hits.

Neither team hit safely during the fourth inning, but the Loggers staged another rally in the fifth that netted two more runs on three hits.

Douglas, first man to face Hanaska in the fifth, flied out to center field, but then Joe Marchand put his husky young shoulders into a choice pitch and parked the ball over the right field fence. Joe, always a threat to any pitcher, is celebrating his third year in Coquille, and as he crossed the plate every Logger in the dugout was waiting to congratulate him for his terrific clout.

Al Forkner followed Marchand's home run with a single and then stole second. Toal then drew a walk and after Stewart popped out to the catcher, Goodman drove a hard single through shortstop to score Forkner. Salisbury then struck out to retire the side, ending the scoring for the day.

Two outstanding fielding plays were credited to the Loggers in the eighth when Al Forkner stopped a sizzling line-drive that was earmarked for a sure hit. Forkner automatically went into the air as the ball hit the bat and came down with it safely tucked away in his glove. Seconds later, Carroll Salisbury raced over from right field nearly into deep center to snare a hard-hit, long ball that might otherwise have gone for a triple.

Don White, making his first appearance in a Logger uniform, created quite an impression on the large crowd in twirling the Loggers to their first win of the year. White gave up three walks but struck out eleven men while allowing two hits. White, a south-paw, comes from Oregon State, and was selected this year on the Northern Division All-Star team, being acclaimed as one of the leading college pitchers on the Pacific Coast.

Sunday, June 25th, the Loggers will play host to Coos Bay at Fortier Field. Game time is 2 p. m. Herb West, veteran relief pitcher for the Loggers, will start the game for the Fortiemen.

Coquille Juniors Win Over Coos Bay

One more Coquille run in the eighth finished the scoring and the game.

Coos Bay picked up one run in the fourth and then was held scoreless until the top of the eighth when the second Coos Bay runner crossed the plate.

Bob Allard, making his first start on the mound for Coquille, struck out eleven men and gave up nine walks.

Claude Liday paved the way for the Coquille win with three hits in five trips to the plate, one of which was a triple.

The victory gave Coquille her first win of the season and came at the expense of the previously undefeated Coos Bay team.

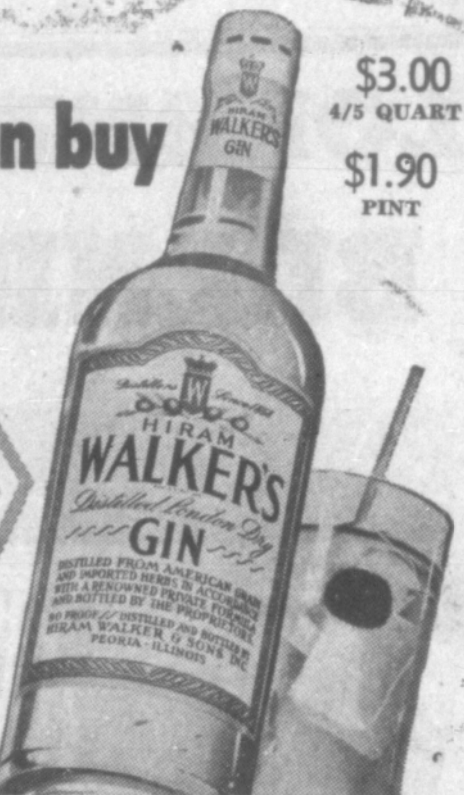
