Bond Drive Sales Continue Upward

Sale of savings bonds in Coos county continued upwards this week with a total of \$42,620 purchased in Coos during the week to make a total of \$62,845 for the drive period so far. Quota for the drive is \$212,000. The drive so far is 29 per cent completed, according to Henry Spargo, drive chairman.

Girl Drowned In East Fork Coquille

Mary Waters, 16, daughter of Mrs. Palmer Endicott of Myrtle Point, was drowned in the east fork of the Coquille river Monday night about 7:45 while wading with a friend, Carol Porter.

The body was located Tuesday morning by Fred Mantz of the Myrtle Point fire department, and the Rev. Wilmer Briggs, using homemade grappling equipment.

Two young boys who were on the scene of the drowning, but unable to swim, attempted a rescue in a boat but were unable to reach the girl. Bill Eckberg and Merlyn Hathaway, two older boys who arrived at the scene, attempted to dive for the body before the arrival of the Myrtle Point fire department and coastguardsmen from Bandon.

Attempts to reach the body went on all night, but searchers were unable to reach it until Mantz and Briggs found it at 8:34 Tuesday morning in water 25 feet deep.

The accident occurred in a canyon behind Libby and was difficult to reach. Both Coos Bay and Coquille crews worked to restore the power.

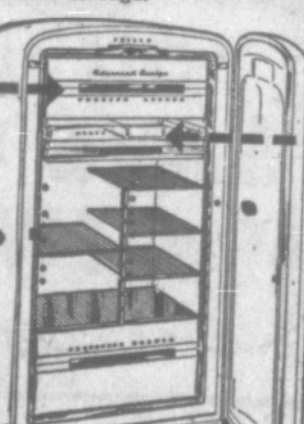
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SAWMILL TO RUN NEW NIGHT SHIFT
